Finding Our Sessions

All of our sessions will take place on the 6th floor of the Hall (H) Building, located at 1455 de Maisonneuve Blvd. West. The escalators are generally quicker than the elevators, particularly when going down. There are also stairs for those looking for a cardio workout.

Upon arrival, register for Congress in the Library (LB) Building, at 1400 de Maisonneuve Blvd. West, directly across the street from our sessions and connected by tunnel in case of rain or snow (well, it probably won't snow). Then check in at our CLSA table outside our session rooms for a copy of our program – the welcome and registration table in the 6th floor corridor of the Hall Building will be open from 8:00 a.m. on June 2 and from 8:30 a.m. on June 3.

Plenary Session

The plenary lecture, “Religion, Race, Rights: Connected Understandings in Anglo-American Law” by Eve Darian-Smith of the University of California, Santa Barbara, will take place on Wednesday, June 2 (day 1) at 4:00 p.m. in H 531 (one floor down from our sessions).

Eve Darian-Smith is a professor in the Global & International Studies Program at the University of California, Santa Barbara. Before going to the United States to study anthropology (M.A. Harvard, Ph.D. Chicago) she practised corporate law in Australia. She is interested in the intersections and connections between law, politics, and culture, and gives particular attention to race and class discriminations, colonial and postcolonial implications, as well as the shifting concepts of sovereignty, nationalism and the nation-state in a global political economy.

She has published a number of books and essays, and her most recent book is *Religion, Race, Rights: Landmarks in the History of Modern Anglo-American Law* (Hart, 2010). She has also published *Bridging Divides: The Channel Tunnel and English Legal Identity in the New Europe* (California, 1999) which was the co-winner of the Law & Society Association Herbert Jacob Book Prize; *Laws of the Postcolonial* (Michigan, 1999) which she co-edited with Peter Fitzpatrick; *New Capitalists: Issues of Law, Politics and Identity Surrounding Casino Gaming on Native American Land* (Wadsworth, 2003); and an edited volume titled *Law and Ethnography* (Ashgate, 2007) for The International Library of Law and Society. She has served on a range of editorial boards including *Studies in Law, Politics and Society*; *American Ethnologist*; *Social and Legal Studies*; *Political and Legal Anthropology Review*; *Law & Social Inquiry*; and is a former associate editor of the *Law & Society Review*.

Trouver nos sessions

Toutes nos sessions auront lieu au 6^{ème} étage de l'Édifice Hall (H), au 1455 boul. de Maisonneuve ouest. Il est généralement plus rapide d'utiliser les escaliers roulants, spécialement lorsqu'on descend. Il y a des escaliers pour ceux et celles qui désirent un exercice cardio.

La plénière

La conférence “Religion, Race, Rights: Connected Understandings in Anglo-American Law” d'Eve Darian-Smith de l'University of California, Santa Barbara, aura lieu mercredi le 2 juin à 16h00 au H 531 (un étage au-dessous de nos sessions).

Eve Darian-Smith est une professeur au programme des Études globales et internationales à l'University of California, Santa Barbara. Avant de poursuivre ses études aux États-Unis en anthropologie (M.A. Harvard, Ph.D. Chicago) elle a pratiqué le droit corporatif en Australie. Elle s'intéresse aux intersections et aux connections entre le droit, la politique et la culture, tout en se penchant sur la discrimination raciale et sociale, les implications coloniales et post-coloniales ainsi qu'à la fluidité des concepts de souveraineté, nationalisme et état-nation dans une économie politique globale.

Elle a publié plusieurs livres et articles. Elle discutera de son plus récent livre *Religion, Race, Rights: Landmarks in the History of Modern Anglo-American Law* (Hart, 2010). Également faisant parti de son œuvre, *Bridging Divides: The Channel Tunnel and English Legal Identity in the New Europe* (California, 1999) un des deux livres qui ont reçu le Law & Society Association Herbert Jacob Book Prize; *Laws of the Postcolonial* (Michigan, 1999), qu'elle a co-édité avec Peter Fitzpatrick; *New Capitalists: Issues of Law, Politics and Identity Surrounding Casino Gaming on Native American Land* (Wadsworth, 2003); ainsi que *Law and Ethnography* (Ashgate, 2007). Elle a fait partie de plusieurs comités de rédaction dont *Studies in Law, Politics and Society*; *American Ethnologist*; *Social and Legal Studies*; *Political and Legal Anthropology Review*; *Law & Social Inquiry*; elle a également siégé comme éditrice associée de la *Law & Society Review*.

Programme and Schedule

The workshops will take place at the McGill Faculty of Law, Room 312, Chancellor Day Hall, 3644 Peel St., Montreal, Quebec H3A 1W9.

12:00-12:45 Check-in and Lunch (free for registrants)

12:45 Session 1: Meet the Author (Rod Macdonald, McGill)

Registered students will have received a draft of a work-in-progress by Professor Roderick Macdonald, a well-known scholar working at the intersection of law and society. Students will be invited to critically engage with the text and provide their feedback.

13:45 Break

14:00 Session 2: Teaching to Transgress (Ummni Khan, Carleton; Gillian Calder, Victoria; Suzanne Bouclin, McGill)

This interactive workshop will include a consideration of creative interventions into class material, both by the professor and by the students, that transgress hegemonic pedagogy. The epistemological benefits will be discussed as well as the practical problems of creating or evaluating artistic or non-traditional approaches. This approach is situated within the field of critical pedagogy, whereby the task of the professor is not to impose a particular narrative of reality, but rather to create dialogic spaces for multiple and often contradictory narratives.

15:15 Session 3: Preparing for an Academic Career I (Shauna Van Praagh, McGill; Ummni Kahn, Carleton)

Considering an academic career?

As graduate students we have a variety of strategies we can use to enhance our future career prospects, such as conference presentation, publishing and teaching. But these often entail a significant cost in time spent away from

one's primary research project, and from competing opportunities. In this workshop we will address such questions as: How do you gauge the best use of your time? When and where and how often to publish? How many conferences should you attend? How many presentations should you give? Should you teach if you don't need to? If you have teaching choices, which should you pursue (i.e. is it better to teach at an easier TA level or a more ambitious course directorship)? Should you stick to teaching one course over several years to hone your skills or attempt to diversify your teaching portfolio?

16:30 Session 4: Preparing for an Academic Career II (Dawn Moore, Carleton)

Continuing the themes presented in the previous session, Preparing for an Academic Career 1, this workshop focuses on the later stages of career planning. We will address questions such as: When should you start job hunting? Where can you look for jobs? What is a job portfolio and when should you start preparing one? How should you prepare for a job interview? What is a 'job talk'? Should you publish as much as possible before job hunting, or hold back to allow for more publication after you are hired to assist in the tenure process? What is a post-doc, and when and why should you apply for one?

Coffee, Restaurants, etc. ♦ Café, restos, etc.

Montreal is known for its restaurants, and while locals disagree on rankings, competition is sufficiently fierce that it's hard to find a bad meal. Explore! If you'd rather zero in on a sure thing, the Congress guide includes many suggestions, but here are a few recommendations for places for lunch, coffee, etc. near Concordia.

In general, Crescent St. (two blocks east of Concordia) is filled with restaurants, bars, and after-hours clubs. There are also concentrations of places on Bishop and Mackay streets south of St-Catherine St.

Coffee

Java U (Hall Building, second floor, opposite the escalators) – coffee, sandwiches.

Myriade (1432 Mackay St.) – coffee. The current favourite spot for coffee among students and faculty.

Première Moisson (1490 Sherbrooke St.) – coffee, pastries.

Restaurants

Havana 1519 (1429 Crescent St.) – gourmet burgers, drinks. For legal historians and constitutional lawyers. I know nothing about the food here, but in the 1940s this building housed Frank Roncarelli's restaurant (then called the Quaff Café), which Quebec Premier Maurice Duplessis famously denied a liquor permit because Roncarelli was a Jehovah's Witness. The Supreme Court's decision in *Roncarelli v. Duplessis* was a milestone in Canadian civil liberties law. Raise a glass to Roncarelli, Ivan Rand, Frank Scott and the others.

Antep Kebab (1626 de Maisonneuve Blvd. West) – Turkish. Great sandwiches on amazing freshly baked bread.

Burritoville (2055 Bishop St.) – burritos, of course (vegetarian). Homemade tortillas and salsa, burritos, etc., all organic.

Ben and Jerry's (1316 de Maisonneuve Blvd. West) – ice cream.

Eggspectations (1313 de Maisonneuve Blvd. West) – breakfast, burgers.

Dévi (1450 Crescent St.) – Indian.

Le Pois Penché (1230 de Maisonneuve Blvd. West) – Parisian-style *brasserie*.

Montréal est reconnu pour ses excellents restaurants, même si les habitués ne s'entendent pas sur LA liste, la compétition féroce entre restaurateurs se charge d'assurer un bon repas presque à tous coups. Explorez! Si vous êtes du genre qui ne prend aucun risque, fiez-vous au Guide du Congrès. De plus, voici quelques suggestions d'établissements situés près de Concordia.

En général, la rue Crescent (deux blocs à l'est de Concordia) est remplie de restaurants, bars et clubs. Vous trouverez aussi plusieurs places sur les rues Bishop et Mackay au sud de la rue St-Catherine.

Café

Java U (Édifice Hall, 2^e étage, en face des escaliers roulants) – café, sandwiches.

Myriade (1432, rue Mackay) – café. La saveur du mois auprès des étudiants et du corps professoral.

Première Moisson (1490, rue Sherbrooke) – café, pâtisseries.

Restaurants

Havana 1519 (1429 rue Crescent) – hamburgeris gourmets, boissons. Pour ceux qui s'intéressent de l'histoire et du droit constitutionnel. Je ne connais pas du tout la nourriture, mais dans les années 1940 cet édifice abritait le restaurant de Frank Roncarelli (à l'époque il s'appelait Quaff Café). Le Premier Ministre Maurice Duplessis lui a refusé un permis d'alcool car Roncarelli était un témoin de Jehovah, et la décision de la Cour suprême dans *Roncarelli c. Duplessis* est significative quant au droit des libertés fondamentales au Canada. Levez votre verre à l'honneur de Roncarelli, Ivan Rand, Frank Scott et les autres!

Antep Kebab (1626, boul. de Maisonneuve ouest) – Turc. Excellentes sandwiches faites de pain frais du jour.

Burritoville (2055, rue Bishop) – burritos (végétarien). Tortillas et salsa faits maison, burritos, etc., tout biologique.

Ben and Jerry's (1316, boul. de Maisonneuve ouest) – crème glacée.

Eggspectations (1313, boul. de Maisonneuve ouest) – petits déjeuners, burgers.

Dévi (1450 rue Crescent) – Indien.

Le pois penché (1230, boul. de Maisonneuve ouest) – brasserie parisienne.
