 1. Early 19th Century Little paid "employment" outside of fur and agricultural Economy largely subsistence, not consumer-based Skilled trades worked in small workplaces 	
 2. Mid 19th Century • Emergence of larger factories in urban centres • More unskilled (or lowskilled) workers from Europe arriving 	
 3. Industrialization (around 1870 onward) • Larger scale production. • Subcontracting model left power in hands of skilled trades • Poor working conditions 	
 4. Emergence of Wide-Scale Factory Employment • Factory owners move to "employment model" • Skilled trades still powerful, form "craft unions" • Law treats craft unions as illegal cartels 	

5. Arrival of "Industrial Unionism"

 Idea that all workers should unionize to protect class interests Pushed by Knight of Labour from 1870s
 6. Scientific Management/Taylorism (late 19th century/early 20th) Idea that workplace most efficient if jobs broken down to series of distinct tasks that a worker does over and over again Deskilling & alienating work process. Very unsatisfying. Poor conditions.
 7. Revival of Industrial Unionism (early 20th century) • Terrible working conditions in Western mines, railways, and factories under Taylorism causes interest again in industrial unionism • "Wobblies" then One Big Union emerge in West, culminating in Winnipeg General Strike (1919)
 8. Depression Era (1920-30s), World War II (early 1940s) Labour unions weakened during depression years But strengthened during WWII
