Some Faces Of Social Injustice

- <u>Economic disparities</u> that concentrate most of the <u>world's wealth</u> <u>under the control of a tiny fragment of humanity</u>, leaving a billion and a half people destitute
- **<u>Relations of dependency and isolation</u>** that keep many <u>battered</u> women in abusive relationships
- <u>The ugliness of racism</u>, not only as a learned pattern of attitude and action but as institutionalized practices that <u>inferiorize those</u> <u>marked as racial minorities</u>
- <u>Media representations that position viewers as passive</u> <u>consumers</u>, whose fulfillment lies in possessing just the right accessories to fit the ideal of affluence
- <u>The lack of control that most working people have over the</u> <u>conditions, process and results of their labour</u>
- The <u>social vulnerability of refugees and migrant workers</u> who are <u>refused basic citizenship rights</u>
- The <u>declining quality of social services</u> and <u>the shrinking space</u> for democratic discussion as corporate agendas come to <u>displace the public good</u>
- The <u>derogation of sexual minorities</u> who do not fit within heterosexist assumptions about "normality"
- The <u>legacy of colonization that has left Indigenous peoples with</u> <u>few organizational means and resources to build sustainable</u> <u>communities and economies</u>
- The <u>ecological degradation and environmental injustice</u> that stem from the <u>priority given to short-term private profits over the</u> <u>health of the earth</u>
