

# Brains on toast: the inexact science of gender

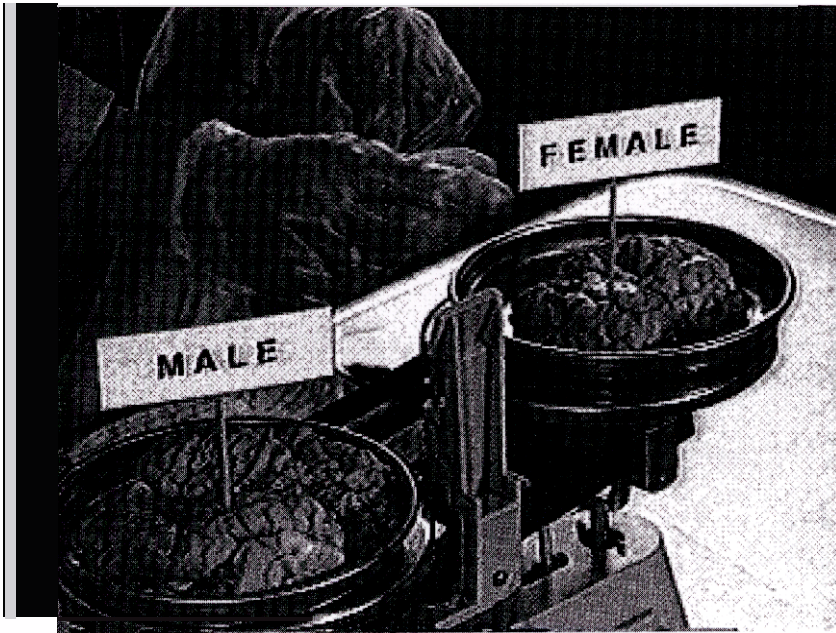
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**T**his experimental videotape presents a humorous examination of scientific theories about gender and sexuality. The cast of eight characters (a professor and her students) grapples with past and present research data on brains, hormones, reproduction and private parts. They discover a legacy of tainted evidence revealing several generations of scientists on a hell-bent mission to create and exaggerate differences between male and female anatomy and cognitive function. The tape digs up a storehouse of suppressed evidence which demonstrates that these biological distinctions are highly ambiguous and frequently non-existent. Throughout the narrative, man-on-the-street interviews are intercut with other scenes, including a bullfight, a dinner party with brains as the main course, and a nightmare sequence which finds the professor in bed with her entire class.

In the 1850s craniologists

were weighing brains and they discovered that women's brains are generally smaller than men's . . . bigger was better, even then, and the researchers concluded that this made men intellectually superior to women . . .



But what about elephants and whales?

They eventually figured out that elephants do have bigger brains than men, and this became known as the

Elephant problem

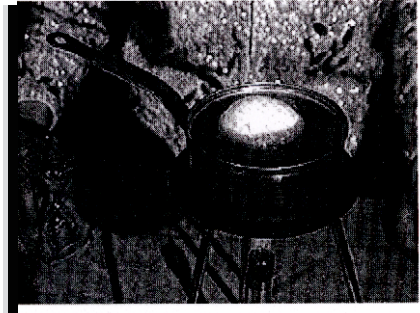
Relative to their body weight, women have bigger brains than elephants

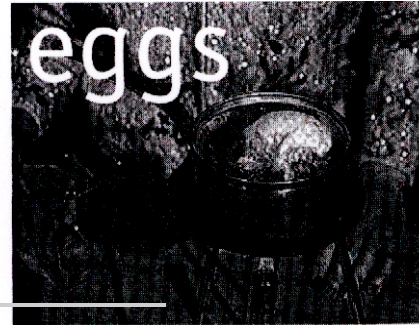
Blood would travel upstream

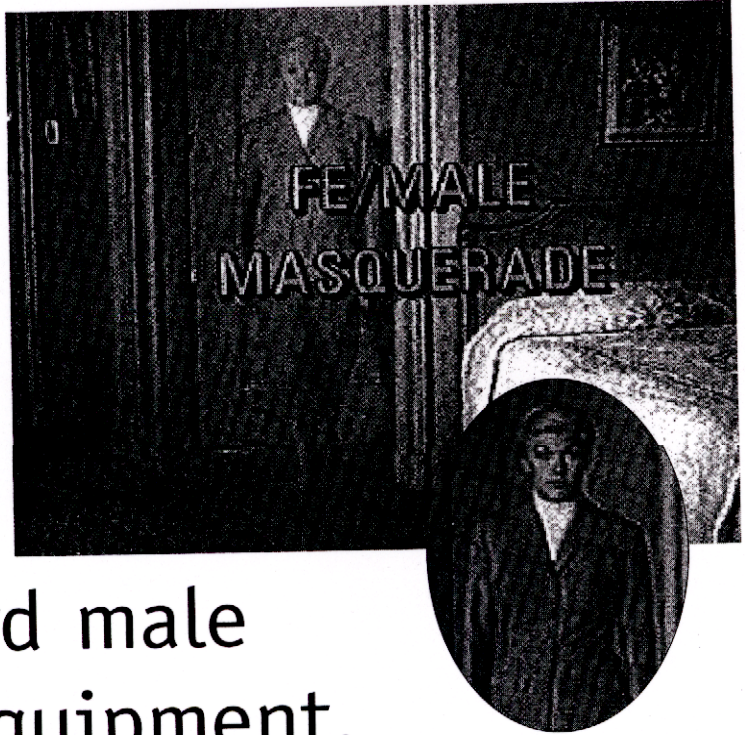
## Low sperm count

that Kim Novak is a biological male who was raised as a female because he/she was born without the . . .

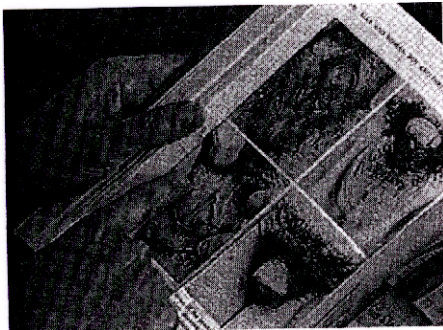
