QUESTION: What is the most recent available data on the major occupations of immigrants arriving in the Toronto CMA?

ANSWER:

Computer programmers were the most numerous occupational group of immigrants planning to settle in the Toronto CMA in 2005 with 2,102 immigrants. Mechanical engineers and electrical and electronics engineers came in second and third places with 1,265 and 1,182 immigrants respectively. Babysitters, nannies and parent's helpers came in fourth with 1,001 immigrants.

The most common occupation represented well-educated professional groups. Engineers accounted for four out of the eight most common occupations: mechanical engineers, electrical and electronics engineers, civil engineers, and computer engineers. Computer-related occupations represented three of the most common occupations: computer programmers, computer systems analysts, computer engineers, and computer programmers and interactive media developers. Finally, three occupations were from the financial sector: financial auditors and accountants, financial managers, and financial and investment analysts.

Percentages were calculated based on the total number of immigrants *planning to enter the labour market after landing* and planning to settle in Toronto in 2005. Immigrants who intend to enter the labour market represent 57,150 of the 112,790 immigrants who landed in 2005 and were planning to settle in Toronto. Immigrants not planning to enter the labour market include students, homemakers, retirees, and other non-workers.

The more recent data available is for 2005. Immigrants were asked on arrival to Canada what was their intended occupation and their city of destination. Data do not take into account subsequent moves to or from Toronto as well as occupational changes.

DEFINITIONS:

Immigrants are permanent residents, formerly called landed immigrants.

Toronto CMA: Census Metropolitan Area of Toronto

The Toronto CMA is the grey-shaded area in the map below. It includes the City of Toronto, York Region, Peel Region and parts of Halton and Durham Regions. Other municipalities, such as New Tecumseth in southern Simcoe County and Mono Township in Dufferin County are also included in the Toronto CMA.
