### **QUESTION:**

What is the most recent data available on the number of newcomers arriving in the Toronto CMA and planning to find work in Red Seal Trades?

### ANSWER:

The number of immigrants planning to settle in Toronto and work in the red seal trades has been decreasing between 2000 and 2005, going from 1,766 in 2000 to 1,060 in 2005.

1354 immigrants landing in 2005 and planning to settle in Ontario were planning to find work in one of the Red Seal Trades. There were 146 immigrants planning to settle in Ontario and planning to work as cooks, followed by 117 immigrants planning to work as Machinists and Machining and Tooling Inspectors (117).

#### **DEFINITIONS:**

A Red Seal Trade is a trade for which all the provinces and territories have agreed on standards for entry into the occupation allowing for the portability of qualifications across Canada. Red Seal Trades are designated by the Interprovincial Standards Program under the authority of the Canadian Council of Directors of Apprenticeship, the body that is also responsible for setting standards in the designated trades. The Red Seal is a passport that allows the holder to work anywhere in Canada without having to write further examinations.

In some provinces, certification is voluntary, meaning that neither a formal certificate nor a formal apprenticeship is required to practise the trade. However, the Red Seal Certificate would indicate that the holder has reached a certain level of expertise, and it may be required by some employers as a condition of employment.
