QUESTION: What is the number of immigrants *intending to work*¹ as nurses² who landed in the timeframe of 2005-2009? Which CMA³ cities in Ontario do they plan to settle in? What are the top source countries among them?

ANSWER:

Table 1 below shows province of destination among immigrants who landed in Canada between 2005 and 2009 who intend to work as nurses. This table shows that Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia are top provinces of destination among these nurses. Table 2 below shows the number of landed immigrants with intended occupation as nurses in Ontario by their landing year. The number of people who intend to work in nursing occupations has increased from 2005 to 2009.

¹ Occupation indicated refers to 'intended occupation' for immigrants upon landing and applying for permanent residence status. Thus, it does not indicate that immigrants in fact have jobs in these occupations after they settle.

² Nurses include those who stated intended occupation (NOC4) as 'Head Nurses and supervisors (NOC4=3151)' and 'Registered Nurses (NOC4=3152)'.

³ CMA stands for Census Metropolitan Area and is a geographical area mainly used by Statistics Canada. The Toronto CMA is includes the City of Toronto, York Region, Peel Region and parts of other regions. Table 3 below shows top CMA cities in Ontario where these nurses settle. Within Ontario, most nurses settle in Toronto CMA (73.9%), followed by Ottawa (6.1%) and Hamilton (5.0%).

Table 4 below shows the top 10 source countries of immigrants who intend to work as nurses in Ontario and landed between 2005 and 2009. The Philippines is the top source country (30.6%) among these nurses, followed by India (10.4%) and the US (8.2%).
