

- Aim was to derive policy and practice outcomes of the TIEDI findings
- However, more questions and areas requiring further research were also identified through the roundtables

Roundtable 1:Changing Pathways to Permanent Residence

- Changing patterns of immigrant class of entry
 - Increasing numbers of temporary residents
 - Expansion of PNPs (although not in Ontario)
 - Increase in LCP immigrants
 - Smaller proportion of skilled worker immigrants in Toronto


Entry of Temporary versus Permanent Residents

Composition of Permanent Resident Entries - Canada


Figure 3: Number of Permanent Residents by Immigration Class Category and Landing Year (1980-2010), Canada


Composition of Permanent Resident Entries - Toronto


Composition of Temporary Resident Entries - Canada

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Changes Within Programs

- New systems for refugee determination
- Changes to the 'points system' for selecting skilled workers
- Modified conditions associated with the LCP

How Have These Changes Affected Community Organizations?

- ✤ Increase in the number of precarious workers
- Immigrant service organizations overburdened with limited funding that fails to match the rising need for services
- Increased pressure to deal with complex cases where people are not eligible for funding based on existing criteria

Emerging Issues

- Mental health issues rising from family separation
- Funding cuts to services further erode social supports
- The difficulty of providing services to LCP workers and other unskilled migrant workers
- Need for more research on transition from temporary to permanent resident under the PNP, LCP and Canadian Experience Class programs
- Need for data on temporary residents as well as those without status

Policy Changes to Help Serve the Needs of a Changing Population

- The funding model should be changed to reflect the changing immigrant population and ensure adequate resources and less competition between service organizations
- Policy changes are required regarding the live-in caregiver framework in order to ensure LCP workers can access services
- Need for legislated protection for workers who fall into exploitative conditions, especially for temporary foreign workers, and for those in an informal labour market

Roundtable 2: Filling the Data Gap

Data and analysis challenges experienced by TIEDI

- Requests for analysis outside of TIEDI's mandate (e.g. nonlabour market outcomes such as childcare needs, and health profile)
- Outdated data (e.g. census data) or non-existing data (e.g. information on temporary residents)
- Requests for neighbourhood-specific labour market outcomes of specific immigrants groups living inside or outside the Greater Toronto Area.
- Limitations in gender- and immigrant group-specific analysis

Program Data

- Significant data exists within individual community organizations (ICAN, ICARE), but not available to workers
- Settlement organizations lack the time and capacity to coordinate, manage and analyze the data that they input.
- Very little sharing of information between organizations even all organizations collect very similar data.

What Information Is Needed?

- Data entry systems to have a space for recording qualitative information, which can later be analyzed
- Data that provides a broader understanding of the labour market, with emphasis on issues such as social capital, networks and effects of class
- Longitudinal information on goal setting and quality of life for an individual would also be beneficial
- Data that compares the number of people landing to those that are being served

Collaboration Between "Experts" and Workers

- At the program level, needs to be collaborative effort between politicians, bureaucrats and service providers to provide a holistic view of labour market needs
- Government officials and those who work in data are often disconnected from service providers that use the data, and unaware of community needs
- One problem with collaboration is that there are competing priorities between governmental departments, which makes effective collaborative projects difficult

Creation of a Feedback Loop

- In order for data to be useful, it must become accessible knowledge
- Service providers would like the data that they are collecting for funders and government agencies to feed back to their own organization as useful, aggregate information
- Service providers would also like to share information between themselves
