

## **The Institution**

The York Centre for International and Security Studies once again acknowledges with gratitude the support of the Security and Defence Forum which continues to provide much of the core and crucial finances for our activities. Together with the active support of York University's Office of the Vice-President for Research and Innovation, as well as the Office of the Dean of Arts, SDF gives us the means to take on a broad range of research, conferences, seminars, publications, and outreach activities, as well as support for graduate students and now relevant undergraduate activities, through leveraging modest funds into a much more substantial budget. A careful reading of the attached financial statement will indicate how this has been accomplished during the past year. As previous reports have indicated we have had the good fortune annually to leverage the combined SDF award with the equivalent in-kind York University support into financial flows that are multiples of these two initial core investments. Perhaps more significant than the budgetary successes have been the research and program deliverables, especially when they are often tied to the exceptional work of our affiliated graduate students. Although YCISS over the years has not been without its challenges, overall I think that we can be pleased how we have progressed "from strength to strength."

During this academic year YCISS was praised by the York Senate Committee on Research in its review of our performance during the past six years. Particular mention was made of the singular contribution over the years by SDF. This laudatory assessment was confirmed by the Senate itself which without reservation renewed the YCISS mandate for another six years. In its report, it took particular note of the scholarly contribution through a mix of research, graduate student supervision and support, related professional activities (conferences, seminars, publications, outreach), and mentoring. It noted the significant contribution of our Centre in encouraging international and security studies research that is theoretically informed and policy relevant on matters of importance to Canada. The Senate also endorsed the need to ensure that during the process of faculty renewal, new appointments should include scholars who could build on and complement YCISS' reputation, thereby not only strengthening YCISS and York University, but also encouraging more graduate students to seek admission into the range of programs relevant to the pursuit of international and security studies, broadly defined.

The YCISS director continues to serve as the chair of the Vice-President Research and Innovation's strategic planning group on international research at York University. Significant progress is being made in both broadening and deepening the range of research and related activities on international studies, especially in our efforts to facilitate trans-disciplinary projects often related directly to Canadian foreign, defence, and security interests.

## **The Program**

This year the Centre has embarked on a number of new projects while continuing to work on others already underway. These are summarized in the ensuing report to SDF. All of these involve a mix of resident faculty, graduate students, and colleagues from elsewhere in Canada and beyond. They often bring together scholars, policy makers, and experts from both the private sector and non-governmental organizations. They usually involve some type of publication in order to ensure wide dissemination of results. The following are, in our estimation, especially noteworthy.

*Canada's International Security Policy*, published in 1995 as a YCISS project supported by DND, DFAIT, and SSHRC, provided a collection of originally commissioned chapters designed to serve the dual purpose of being a scholarly resource and a principal text for upper division and graduate students. It was and remains the only book that focusses on the breadth of Canadian defence policy while locating it in the larger context of security policy. It is now out of print and arguably out of date. A major Centre project is to bring together leading experts from across Canada to draft an entirely new version of a post-Cold War, post-9/11 edition. This will involve an authors' workshop in the spring to be followed by a conference in the winter of 2005, leading to a book manuscript within the following year. Our intention is to involve as appropriate colleagues from across the SDF community.

YCISS has launched a new outreach program which mixes a public lecture series on our campus involving distinguished invited scholars with a regular series of forums on major Canadian and international security and defence issues held off campus in various locations throughout the Greater Toronto Area. Combined with our initiative to make available our Working Paper series through our website, we are now reaching a much larger audience of concerned Canadians. These activities complement our already active program of research seminars open to the university community and the public but which focus primarily on scholarly research, along with our conferences which are often more professionally focussed and, in some cases, available by invitation only.

YCISS also has initiated *SDF-Net* which is designed to bring together faculty and graduate students from both SDF-supported programs and those without among the southern Ontario universities. We invited The Laurier Centre for Military, Strategic, and Disarmament Studies to co-sponsor this effort, drawing on their strength in military and diplomatic history. We see this as a modest contribution towards building a broader and deeper community of researchers involved in Canadian defence and security matters. We are particularly keen in engaging graduate students and younger faculty, providing them a sense of intellectual community and mentoring. We also are now having our proposed *Critical Security Studies Journal* evaluated by a number of publishers. Finally, we are waiting to hear about an SSHRC-RDI award in support of the New Canadians and International Affairs: Security and Foreign Policy in a Pluralistic Democracy project.

### **Further Issues for Consideration**

Like some other research centres, YCISS is especially proud of its graduate students, many of whom have gone on to positions in universities here and abroad, into DND, DFAIT, or CIDA, or moved on to careers in international institutions including NATO and the UN. We maintain an active network of YCISS alumni, some of whom – usually but not exclusively in the GTA – are able to remain regularly involved in YCISS projects and activities while fulfilling their primary responsibilities to their home universities. We believe that it is important to acknowledge their contributions to YCISS, and to the SDF program even when their new home university is not itself part of the SDF network.

It is this group of colleagues who have been at the core of our first exercise in undertaking a “critical defence review.” The initial results of that exercise have been published and widely disseminated throughout the SDF network as well as others in university and government. The response to that brief paper, in conjunction with the debates only now emerging around new political leadership both in Canada and abroad, will inform us as we undertake a more substantial “critical defence review” over the coming year or so.

### **A Note from the Director**

30 June will be my final day as director of the York Centre for International and Security Studies. After three terms and more than fifteen years as director, as of 1 July YCISS will have the opportunity to build on existing strengths. The internal search process, under the joint supervision of the Vice-President Research and Innovation and the Dean of Arts, has just begun and should confirm my successor in plenty of time for the coming academic year.

It is a good time to step down. Many new projects are underway; the funding formula for the next few years is in place; we are secure in the knowledge that we have exceptionally talented staff, outstanding graduate students, and very supportive faculty. This is an opportune moment for a new director to chart a new course, building on the best of what we have and introducing innovation and new energy. Being part of the SDF community offers reassurance that material support is available and that intellectual space for creative initiatives is protected and, indeed, nurtured.

Let me take this opportunity to once again offer my thanks and appreciation for the continuous support, first by the then Military and Strategic Studies Program and now from the Security and Defence Forum, shown to YCISS and, indeed, to all centres and chairs that have benefitted from the farsighted commitment by the Department of National Defence in supporting research and teaching about Canadian and international defence and security at universities across Canada.

On a personal note, let me add that the MSSP/SDF program has been a remarkable undertaking, where DND appreciated the need to make a modest investment in human capital where the returns would be often intangible, distant, and at times not entirely of their liking. It is all the more remarkable that the MSSP/SDF process not only allowed but at times encouraged diversity of views, of activities, of deliverables and even when some of us work in areas which seem far removed from the demands of a modern military establishment, there was tolerance and appreciation for the importance of ensuring the independence and autonomy of the intellectual program. For all these reasons and many more, it is been both a pleasure and a distinct honour to have been associated for so many years with the MSSP/SDF programs sponsored by the Department of National Defence.

1.1	<b>What is the Centre's mission statement?</b>	The York University Centre for International and Security Studies is guided by an underlying philosophy that encourages theoretically-informed empirical research in international and security studies. The Centre pursues a triple mandate of teaching, research, and outreach with an explicit interest in facilitating critical thinking among scholars and between researchers and the policy community.
1.2	<b>What is the relationship between the mission statement and the activities of the SDF centre?</b>	In order to implement this mandate, YCISS organizes regular and special seminars and conferences, undertakes and facilitates collaborative research within Canada and abroad, serves as the secretariat for professional academic organizations, and provides opportunities for the publication of research findings.

<p><b>1.3</b></p>	<p><b>Describe briefly the regional and linguistic importance of the Centre/Chair and, where applicable, the importance of the Centre/Chair activities to various cultural communities.</b></p>	<p>YCISS is regularly called upon by various cultural communities to provide information and assistance concerning international issues of concern. Since Toronto is an important and large media centre, YCISS faculty and associates not only are interviewed by the broadcast and print media, but often are called upon to provide background briefings. Located in the largest urban centre in Canada, YCISS is uniquely situated to bridge between the business community, government, NGOs, and the general public. We interact regularly with the Canadian Forces College, local and international NGOs, and universities to promote a dialogue on security and defence issues in Toronto.</p> <p>Recognizing the multicultural character of Toronto and, indeed, of Canada, YCISS has faculty and students who are able to converse with Canadians not only in both official languages, but also in Russian, Ukrainian, Serbo-Croatian, Spanish, German, Portugese, Japanese, Chinese, Persian (Dari), Bengali, Turkish, Khmer, Greek, Punjabi, and Hindi. We have the good fortune of drawing on the linguistic expertise not only of regular faculty, but also visitors and the ever-changing graduate student cohort. We also can draw upon colleagues at other York University research centres as necessary, for example, from the Canadian Centre for German and European Studies, the York Centre for Asian Research, and the Centre for Research on Latin America and the Caribbean.</p>
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<p><b>1.4</b></p>	<p><b>How do the activities you've undertaken in the current fiscal year match what you undertook to do in your funding proposal?</b></p>	<p>Activities undertaken in 2003-04 match well with our plans as laid out in our funding proposal and amended in our 2002-03 Annual Report. YCISS has continued its development of Ethics and International Intervention, New Canadians and International Affairs: Security and Foreign Policy in a Pluralistic Democracy, and the scholarly journal on Critical Security Studies.</p> <p>YCISS is a partner with the Liu Institute at UBC in the Canadian Consortium on Human Security and will continue to work on human security both in the national and global contexts.</p> <p>A Critical Security Studies journal proposal including commitments to the project from scholars from around the globe, was submitted to two commercial publishers this year as was set out in last year's report.</p> <p>YCISS has implemented a new Outreach program targeted at the general public entitled Contemporary Dilemmas in Canadian Security Lecture Series. Information on this initiative can be found in Section 2 of this report.</p>
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		<p>Stimulated by an awareness of the value of the SDF program and a desire to reach out to colleagues and graduate students in southern Ontario universities who are not part of the SDF network, we developed an additional component to our Outreach program which focuses on the creation of a research network. Called SDF-Net, this program is designed to bring together faculty, students, and independent researchers from across southern Ontario universities and colleges interested in Canadian and international security and defence issues. We invited The Laurier Centre for Military Strategic and Disarmament Studies SDF centre to partner with us. The inaugural meeting, attended by more than 30 researchers, was held at YCISS in November 2003. The next meeting is planned for April 2004 to be held at The Laurier Centre for Military Strategic and Disarmament Studies. We expect to hold two meetings each academic year to stimulate opportunities for collaborative research, knowledge dissemination, and consolidation of an intellectual community.</p>
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<p><b>1.5</b></p>	<p><b>What activities are planned for next year? How do they match what you undertook to do in your funding proposal?</b></p>	<p>All activities planned for 2004-05 fit within the mandate outlined in the funding proposal.</p> <p>YCISS in collaboration with the International Security Research and Outreach Program, DFAIT, has undertaken a national survey of University courses on WMD and related topics. In cooperation with the Canadian Forces College and the <i>Armed Forces and Society</i> journal, YCISS will be hosting the annual IUS Canada Conference in downtown Toronto from 1-3 October 2004.</p> <p>For 2004-05 YCISS plans to continue to develop the project on New Canadians and International Affairs: Security and Foreign Policy in a Pluralistic Democracy with the hope of securing funding for a pilot survey; we have submitted an SSHRC-RDI application.</p> <p>In 1995, YCISS sponsored the publication of <i>Canada's International Security Policy</i>, the first and still only book that brought together original research on Canadian security and defence policy that was designed both as a reference and as a source text for upper division and graduate courses. It is now out of print and arguably out of date. We are now working towards developing a successor volume. This entails the commissioning of original new work reflecting the dramatic changes as well as being cognizant of the ongoing fundamentals facing Canada in addressing the security and defence challenges of the post-Cold War, post-9/11 world. Following an authors' workshop to be held in late spring of 2004, the Centre will host a major conference to engage draft chapters.</p>
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		<p>YCISS has developed a proposal for an intensive short course, to be offered between semesters and designed for a mix of people drawn from universities, colleges, NGOs, and government. This course, “The Future of Multilateralism in the Changing Global Order,” will focus on issues of arms control, WMD proliferation, intervention, and related matters that bring international institutions into direct involvement with the challenges of war, conflict, and peace making. It is intended to provide practitioners as well as researchers with up-to-date information of the increasingly complex world of defence and security, with a particular appreciation for the interests of Canada. A pilot course is planned for summer 2004.</p> <p>Other new programs and initiatives include publishing the proceedings from our Eleventh Annual Conference on “Governance and Global (Dis)Orders: Trends, Transformations, and Impasses,” the addition of support for undergraduate student initiatives related to security and defence, and a national media outreach event to be held in Toronto in the fall of 2004 in conjunction with the Centre for Foreign Policy Studies, Dalhousie University, and the Centre for Security and Defence Studies, Carleton University on the “Great Canadian BMD Debate.”</p> <p>YCISS will continue to provide opportunities for researchers to meet, discuss, and exchange ideas. These will include the Post-Communist Studies Programme Seminar Series, the Afternoon Seminar Series, the Distinguished Critical Thinkers in World Politics Seminar Series, the YCISS Annual Conference, and our Working Paper series.</p>

**SDF-Net**

SDF-Net is an initiative designed to strengthen the Southern Ontario community of researchers whose interests encompass aspects of international security, Canadian foreign and defence policy, and related issues. To this end, the Laurier Centre for Military Strategic and Disarmament Studies at Wilfrid Laurier University and the Centre for International and Security Studies at York University seek to bring together researchers from centres and programs supported through the Security and Defence Forum of the Department of National Defence, researchers from centres and programs that are not formally connected to the SDF program, and independent researchers, to explore the possibilities for cooperative research, teaching, and outreach activities.

The inaugural meeting of the SDF-Net, which was held on 28 November 2003, at York University, provided participants, who included faculty members, post-doctoral fellows, graduate students, and independent researchers from across Southern Ontario, with an opportunity to share ideas on trends and developments in international security and Canada's international security role, which reflected a range of theoretical and methodological approaches. A second event is planned for early April 2004.

**Security Sector Reform in South Eastern Europe: An Inventory of Initiatives**

Security Sector Reform in South Eastern Europe: An Inventory of Initiatives is a research project being carried out by YCISS on behalf of the Stability Pact for South Eastern Europe (Working Table III on Security Issues). The Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs has provided funding for this project.

The main objective of this project is to encourage transparency and information-sharing in security sector reform, and to provide an accessible decision-making tool for those countries and international organizations involved in this process. It aims to encourage better and more focused approaches to security sector reform, both by providing an inventory of ongoing or recently-completed initiatives and by identifying gaps and overlaps in international engagement in the region. Ideally, these tools will facilitate the work of decision-makers in developing future initiatives that are more focused, and ultimately, more effective.

### **The Canadian Consortium on Human Security**

YCISS is a new partner in the Canadian Consortium on Human Security (CCHS). The CCHS is an academic-based network promoting policy-relevant research on human security. CCHS is funded by a grant from the Canadian Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade (DFAIT).

The CCHS aims to:

- Facilitate the exchange of information and analysis on human security issues;
- Build an academic human security community in Canada and internationally;
- Promote deeper collaboration on human security issues involving academics, NGO representatives, and officials from governments and international institutions;
- Place Canada at the cutting edge of human security issues, deepening domestic and international support for the realization of human security policy goals, and to exercise a leadership role in the international academic and think-tank communities on human security.

### **Canadian Consortium on Asia Pacific Security (CANCAPS)**

CANCAPS is a not-for-profit association aimed at the promotion of research, publication, and public awareness activities on Asia Pacific security issues, with a particular emphasis on Canadian involvement. CANCAPS understands “security” to be broadly defined, encompassing economic, cultural, environmental, demographic, and other issues, as well as traditional political and military concerns. “Asia Pacific” is also broadly interpreted to include Canada, the United States, Northeast Asia, Southeast Asia, South Asia, Australia, New Zealand, and the South Pacific. CANCAPS has two administrative offices, one at YCISS, York University and one at the University of British Columbia.

CANCAPS’ main activities are as follows:

- publication of the CANCAPS Bulletin, a 16-page newsletter that appears four times a year. It includes articles by Canadians about Asia Pacific security developments, reports of Canadian government policy, updates on the Council for Security Cooperation in Asia Pacific (CSCAP), information about new resources (publications, conference papers, World Wide Web sites, etc.), and a list of upcoming events, all having to do with Asia Pacific security;
- publication of the CANCAPS Papiers, a series of working papers on Asia Pacific security issues;
- publication of the CANCAPS Directory, a directory of Canadian specialists in Asia Pacific security issues;
- working groups; and
- an Annual Conference, typically held in December.
