Keynote Speakers

Heather Jeffrey



Heather Jeffrey was appointed as the new President of the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC), in February 2023. From October 2021 until her appointment at PHAC, she served as Associate Deputy Minister at Health Canada. Prior to this, she served as Health Canada's Assistant Deputy Minister (Strategy and Integration) within the COVID-19 Task Force. She also served as Assistant Deputy Minister for Consular, Security and Emergency Management from 2017 to 2020 and as Director General for International Humanitarian Assistance from 2015 to 2017 at Global Affairs Canada.

Heather joined the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade in 1996, serving at a variety of positions in Ottawa and abroad.

Heather has an MA in International Affairs from Carleton University, a Graduate Diploma in International Relations from Johns Hopkins University (Bologna) and a

BA (Honours) in Political Science from Carleton University.

Dr. Kieran Moore

Dr. Moore served as the Medical Officer of Health for Kingston, Frontenac, Lennox and Addington from 2011 to 2021. Dr. Moore is also the Medical Officer of Health of the Department of Emergency and Family Medicine of Queen's University and the Program Director of Public Health and Preventive Medicine at Queen's University.

Dr. Moore received his Medical degree from the University of Ottawa and subsequently received his specialty certification in Family Medicine and Emergency Medicine from the College of Family Physicians of Canada. Dr. Arra is the Medical Officer of Health for the Grey Bruce Health Unit. He holds a Master's Degree in Epidemiology Biostatistics, and medical specialty qualifications in Public Health and Preventive Medicine (PHPM) by both the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada, and the American Board of Preventative Medicine. He also currently holds two adjunct faculty positions at the PHPM Residency training program, Northern Ontario School of Medicine, and the Master of Public Health program, Western University.

During residency training and practice, he worked on a variety of public health initiatives including - emergency management, road safety, health effects of wind farms, and resource prioritization. He has participated in a number of accreditation reviews of postgraduate medical education as part of the College of Physicians and Surgeons of

Canada accreditation team, and served on a number of postgraduate committees.

Dr. Eric Kennedy

Kennedy's research focuses on knowledge production and mobilization in emergency management contexts. His work has explored the use of models/technical advice in forest fire management, as well as disaster research methods and data collection practices in COVID and natural disaster contexts. His current research explores the structure and institutional design of knowledge synthesis mechanisms in emergency advisory contexts, as well as sector planning mechanisms that influence research funding and practice in the wildfire context. Kennedy also works on these issues in practical ways, such as serving in emergency advisory roles like the Ontario Public Health Emergencies Science Advisory Committee.

Speakers

Dr. Nnamdi Ndubuka



Dr. Nnamdi Ndubuka, is a public health physician working as a Medical Health Officer with the Northern Inter-Tribal Health Authority in northern Saskatchewan. He is an Associate Professor at the College of Medicine, University of Saskatchewan with a cross appointment at School of Public Health.

As a researcher and public health expert, Dr. Ndubuka is particularly interested in the contribution of social determinants of health to infectious disease epidemiology including TB, HIV- and HCV-related risk behaviors and public health practices. Over the past decade, Dr. Ndubuka has worked collaboratively with policy makers, academia, Indigenous communities, and people with lived experience on several community-based studies concentrating on the social construct of communicable disease-related risks.

Dr. Ndubuka is an advocate of social determinants of health, anti-Black racism, quality improvement, equity, diversity and inclusivity. He has a passion for leadership, good governance and research. He has published several peer-reviewed articles and presented at various conferences both locally and internationally.

Dr. Grace Akinjobi

Grace Akinjobi is a Manager of Public Health at the Northern Inter-Tribal Health Authority, where she oversees public health programs including COVID 19 which is part of the communicable disease program; sexually transmitted and blood borne infections such as HIV and Hepatitis C, gonorrhea, chlamydia, and syphilis; TB; Immunization and Maternal Health; Infection Prevention and Control; Health Promotion; Environmental Health; Epidemiology and various researches.

Grace has over 15 years' experience in public and population health. She is passionate about improving the health of the population through the development of relevant public health programs using best



practices, health promotion/education and putting in place healthy public policy. Grace participates in the development of several strategies aimed at the care and prevention of infectious diseases, COVID 19 inclusive. Her research interest focuses on improving the health outcomes of Indigenous community members, health system, equality and equity. As a result, she has collaborated with First Nations communities, Saskatchewan Health authority, Indigenous Services Canada (ISC), University of Saskatchewan, Saskatchewan Ministry of Health, Saskatchewan Cancer Agency and Public Health Agency of Canada amongst others to work on public health programs and researches. Research participated in include but not limited to Sexually Transmitted and Blood Borne Infections, Tuberculosis (TB) Infection, Immunization, and COVID infection.

Dr. Lisa Waddell




