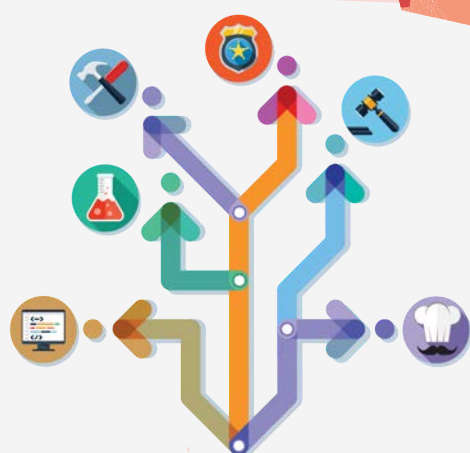

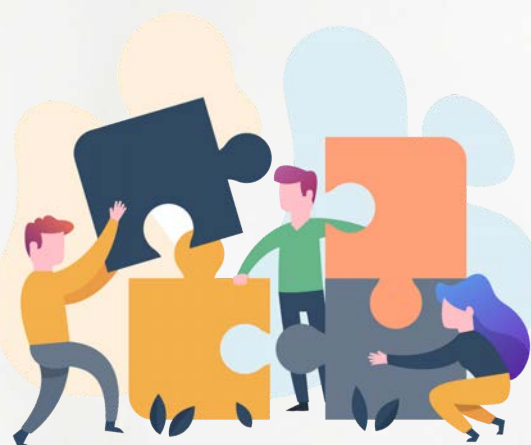
Becoming a Careers Advisor not only involves helping an individual choose their path, but it focuses on a great deal of communicating and working towards setting goals for yourself.

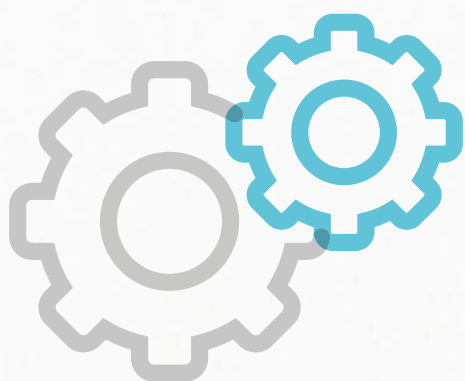
Building Relationships with Students

Providing Advice and Guidance Services

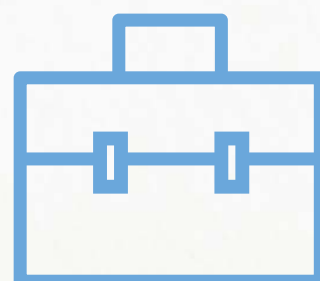
You will have the opportunity to provide purposeful advice to a range of individuals who are in need of support that will have an impact on their working lives.

Undergraduate Degree

With just an undergraduate degree it is possible to gain experience in the field as a 'Job Searcher'.



Career Development Practitioner Certificate

To work at the non-profit level and in jobs like 'Career Advising', 'Career Educator' and 'Job Searching', a Post-Graduate certificate is required.



Masters in Counselling

To be a 'Career Counsellor', and often to work in Universities and Colleges, a Masters in Counselling, Psychology is required.
