STUDY TRIP TO THE UNITED NATIONS

WEEKLY COLLOQUIUMS

Heading the master's in Public and International Affairs is Associate Professor Francis Garon, whose fields of expertise include immigration, multiculturalism and transculturalism, politics and government.

Aside from his teaching duties, Professor Garon hosts a weekly colloquium series, conducted over 24 weeks, under the Chatham House Rules. These are small group discussions designed to offer a unique window into the role of practitioners and the challenges faced in public and international affairs. National and international experts introduced students to a wide range of current challenges with an exclusive 'behind-the-scenes' view.

Notable speakers for 2023-2024 included:

- Ms Aleqa Hammond, former Prime Minister of Greenland speaking on challenges in the Arctic
- Ambassador (retired) Jon Allen, speaking on the Middle East

- Col. Malin Persson, Swedish Armed Forces, sharing views on Sweden's decision to join NATO.
- Ms. Nicole Doray, Suzuki Foundation, and Ms. Elizabeth Robertson, addressing the role of archaeological assessment as part of public infrastructure works.


CAPSTONE SEMINAR

Deborah Matthews, former Deputy Premier of Ontario and Finance Minister, taught our Capstone Seminar and guided graduate students in developing a policy proposal according to a template for cabinet Submissions.

Student cabinet Submissions covered topics such as:

- Therapeutic-oriented alternatives to solitary confinement for incarcerated individuals with mental health disabilities.
- Taxing sugar sweetened beverages.
- · Amending the Vital Statistics Act, and
- Promoting the future Black Lawyers of Ontario Initiative.

INTERNSHIPS



Bilingual students are a main recruitment demographic for hiring managers across the sector. Internships included the federal government, federal MP constituency offices, the Ontario Public Service, non-government organizations, and the Belgian Embassy in Ottawa.

Thanks to a cooperation agreement signed in April 2023 with the NATO Security Force Assistance Centre of Excellence in Rome, a Glendon student was offered a summer internship assignment in Italy. The graduate student extended the post to the UN and also spent a few days with the UN Department of Disarmament, Demobilisation and Reintegration.

The impact of all placements was significant, with several students stating that the placements were 'transformative'.

Some learning experiences were unexpected. Interns at MP constituency offices also witnessed vicious hate attacks directed at the MPs. Nevertheless, students carried out their duties in a professional way and often under extreme stress. One student was invited to the Prime Minister's annual garden party, met a number of senior ministers and was invited to attend the Black Caucus meeting.

PREPARING STUDENTS FOR THEIR INTERNSHIP

The internship season 2023-2024 was directed by Ms. Marion MacKenzie, an award-winning senior executive with international experience in both the corporate and consulting sectors.

While some students drew on an existing database of internship opportunities, others used their own research to identify placements that were closely aligned with their professional interests.

In addition, Senior BMO Fellow Andrew Mackey provided students with guidelines on how to draft government memos, background and decision notes. Interns consistently highlight this as an important skill in navigating the challenges of their internship duties.

The work of Ms. MacKenzie, in cooperation with faculty members such as Andrew Mackey, provided the students with a strong foundation to succeed. We are also pleased to report that supervisors assessed 87% of the summer 2024 cohort of interns as either 'Outstanding' or 'Excellent.'

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT & PARTNERSHIPS: GLENDON GLOBAL DIALOGUE SERIES



Under the leadership of Director Pond, the Glendon Global Dialogue series (GGD) complements the academic program with a focus on urgent global issues and trends.

Open to all students, faculty, alumni, as well as the public, the events provide an important opportunity to bring exceptional talent to the campus to engage with the wider community.

Attendees can take part in-person on campus or join online.

The first GGD was conducted in November 2023 and included a panel of three addressing "Arctic Security: Are we ready for the future?" The panel included Ms. Aleqa Hammond, former Prime Minister of Greenland, as well as Professors Gabrielle Slowey of York University and Kari Roberts of Mount Royal University. The session was opened by the reading of the land acknowledgement in the Nunavik dialect of Inuktitut by Raigilie Mackey, a Glendon student from Nunavik.

As part of the series, a speakers' dinner is hosted by the Director of the Glendon School of Public and International Affairs. The dinner brings together speakers, faculty, and students to engage with change makers in an informal setting.

NATIONAL PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION CASE COMPETITION

Since 2011, a team of students has competed in the National Public Administration Case Competition organized by the Canadian Association for Programs in Public Administration. Twelve to 15 teams from across Canada take part every year for one of the three top positions. Students are provided a policy question and given one week to present a response to a panel.

In 2024 our team was composed of three students:

Mouctar Bah, Jeremy Ofwono, and Carrie Weiller.

Coached by BMO Senior Fellow Andrew Mackey and Professor Ian Roberge, the topic for February 2024 was related to the issue of contracting. Students were asked to provide an assessment of the challenges and to outline advice for decision-makers.

Students consistently rate the competition as a valuable experience in understanding how decisions are made and the importance of teamwork.

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The Case Study Competition was a real eye-opener. I saw the level of detail required by policy analysts in the real world, which I hadn't fully experienced in the classroom. I have a clearer idea of the skills and experiences I need to focus on moving forward.

APPENDIX

STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Total enrolment in the MPIA program for 2023-2024 was 34 students. This included 15 first year students, including three from the Dual Degree with IEP Strasbourg, and one international student.

The cohort of 19 second year students included five exchange students from the Dual Degree with IEP Strasbourg, and one international student. While the majority of domestic students are drawn from Ontario, the MPIA continue to attract students from across the country.

CONVOCATION

Ten students graduated at the convocation ceremony on June 7, 2024 with a Master of Arts in Public and International Affairs. We wish all our graduates the best as they take their next steps in academia or in the workplace.
