Course: GS/ECON 5520 3.0 Economics of Financial Markets

Course Description: The objective of the course is to undertake a rigorous study of the theoretical foundations of modern financial economics. The course covers the central themes of modern finance including market efficiency, individual investment decisions under uncertainty, mean-variance theory, capital market equilibrium and asset valuation, and arbitrage pricing theory. Theoretical analysis of the problems is combined with empirical exercises based on the use of real financial data.

Course Project: The project consists of doing a set of empirical exercises using real financial data. The project is due in class on the day noted. Late projects will not be accepted.

Appropriate Documentation: Exams missed due to medical circumstances must be supported by a physician's statement or a statement by a psychologist or a counsellor. The physician's office may be contacted to verify that the statement was actually completed by the physician. Exams missed due to non-medical circumstances must be supported by appropriate documentation, i.e., death certificates, obituary notices, automobile accident reports, airline/train/bus tickets/receipts for emergency travels (with the date of booking on the ticket), etc. Airline/train/bus tickets/receipts must indicate destination, departure, and return dates. Having to work at the time of an exam or non-emergency travels are not considered valid excuses for missing the exam.
