# Major Field Exam in Postcolonial Literature

For the purposes of the examination, postcolonial literature is divided into the following fields:

- African Diaspora
- Canada
- Global South
- South Asia (primarily India and Pakistan)
- The Middle East
- East Asia
- Caribbean (still under development)

The aim of studying pos colonial as a specialisation is to gain a broad understanding of the field, its literary production, and critical debates as possible. The field, however, is vast and is growing. Students must work with their supervisor to select at least three fields in order to best inhabit the intent of the aim. These three fields will consist of approximately sixty texts. Then there will be twenty compulsory texts that provide a general introduction to the theoretical concerns of the field.

To pass your postcolonial major field exam, **choose twenty texts from the golden theory lists**, in addition to **selecting 3 fields** from the list of fields, below. Make sure that you choose twenty texts in each of these fields, for a total of 80 texts. The remaining twenty texts will be decided by the student in consultation with their supervisor.

#### So, to summarize:

Golden theory list: 20 texts – all students must read and select twenty texts from this list. Fields: pick three different fields – choose 20 texts in each field – for a total of 60 texts The remaining twenty texts are selected by the student themselves.

The students will be questioned on the theory lists, the three selected fields, and their own suggested texts.
