- To understand the changing relations between politics, society, violence, domination, social movements and the state.
- To prepare students to teach political sociology and social movements and to conduct research in these areas.
- To help students to become conversant with “big” questions about political sociology and social movements.

Instructions to Students

This reading list was designed to balance required readings with readings chosen by the student. In total you should create a reading list consisting of the equivalent of 25 medium-sized books (5 journal articles or chapters = 1 medium-sized book)/125 articles. Students may choose individual chapters from any of the edited collections included in this reading list.

Your final list must include:

- 1) The required (bolded) readings. This is equivalent to 62 articles or 12.4 books or some combination thereof. You are required to read something from the Nationalism category, which can be a book or article.
- 2) Additional readings from this list will be identified by the student in consultation with their comprehensive exam committee. (Equivalent to 32 articles)
- 3) Additional readings not on this list can be selected by the student (up to a maximum of 25% of your final reading list). (Up to 31.2 articles)
