# Learning Log (10% of final grade)

#### **Objectives:**

- 1. To encourage students to look for examples of sociological significance as they occur outside the lecture hall.
- 2. To assist students to develop an understanding of the concepts taught in the lectures as they relate to "real world" situations.
- 3. To help students become more knowledgeable about sociological issues vis-à-vis sport and sport practices.

#### **Procedures:**

- 1. Students are required to make one entry per week in the learning log.
- 2. Each week, during the last lecture on Thursday, each student will submit a new entry for the professor to acknowledge. Each entry must contain a brief comment (maximum one page in length).
- 3. A weekly entry is defined as:

- a clipping/print-out from a newspaper or magazine (with your comments) that relates to lecture material from that particular week; OR
- b) a description of an issue seen on TV/online/social media or heard on the radio/podcast (with your comments) that relates to lecture material from that particular week; OR
- c) information acquired from a research journal or textbook (other than our own) that relates to lecture material from that particular week.
- 4. The log must be done neatly and presented as one unit (e.g. 3 ring binder or similar system), each week for the professor to stamp.
- 5. The log must be submitted November 24<sup>th</sup>, 2022 and will not be returned to students after marking.

## **Evaluation:**

Each student's complete learning log should include ten weekly submissions. All ten submissions are required for the log to be eligible for final marking. 2/10 of the final log's submissions will be randomly selected for marking and each will be assigned a mark out of five (totalling 10). If the selected submissions are presented neatly and meet the entry criteria outlined above, the log will earn top marks. Work of lesser quality (e.g., messy, poorly done) will earn lower marks.

# Power-point Assignment (10% of final grade)

Students are required to prepare a 6-slide PowerPoint presentation. The topics will be assigned to students randomly on a list posted in eClass.

Your job is to identify the most salient parts of the topic assigned and create a six (6)-slide PP presentation (the cover slide doesn't count among the 6 required slides). You can select the whole topic (for example, Social Class) or part of the topic (i.e., social class of Canadian Olympic athletes). You can be as creative as you want. However, this is an academic work and well-written, insightful, and thought-provoking slides are expected.

#### Appeals Process:

Assignments are graded by an experience marker who is a knowledgeable and experienced one. You may ask for a grade reassessment on an assignment within a week after receiving the grade. This, however, is not an ordinary occurrence but an exception. Simply wanting a higher grade is not an acceptable reason for requesting a reassessment. If you feel that your assignment has been wrongly graded, explain why in a one-page, typed letter. Attach this to your graded assignment and hand it in to the

Course Director. Your assignment will then be reassessed by me. Your grade may go up, down, or remain the same. Appeals process decisions are final.
