Course: PKIN 0751: Advanced First Aid and CPR

Organization of the course:

This is a practical course and students will be required to actively participate in each session. Students will be required to demonstrate their skills through in class demonstration, observing fellow students and providing feedback to other students. Students will work with the instructor and their peers to increase their knowledge and skill in weekly classes.

Expanded Course Description:

This is an Advanced First Aid / CPR HCP/ BLS training course that will build on the theory and skill that students developed in the PKIN 750: Emergency Care (or the Standard First Aid certification.) Students will become familiar with a variety of resuscitation equipment to enhance rescue treatment and work toward acquiring additional certifications.

The course will be taught through lectures, demonstrations, practise, and discussion. This is a practical course and students will be required to actively participate in each session. Through practice, observation and feedback students will develop the required skills. Students will work with the instructor and their peers to increase their knowledge and skill.

Learning Objectives:

The Advanced First Aid / HCP/ BLS training is a positive and useful tool for Kinesiology students during their time at York as well as after graduation. This course upgrades and compliments prior training. Students will work towards completing several certifications throughout the course including Heart and Stroke's BLS, and Lifesaving Society's Health Care Provider CPR, Anaphylaxis Rescuer and Airway Management.

The students will be able to

- Demonstrate one and two-rescuer adult, child, and infant cardiopulmonary resuscitation on a manikin.
- Demonstrate the treatment for an unconscious adult, child, or infant with an obstructed airway.
- Demonstrate rescue breathing on a manikin.
- Demonstrate use of a Bag-Valve-Mask (BVM).

- Demonstrate knowledge of when to use and how to operate an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), including maintenance of AED unit, data management and reporting protocols.
- Understand the various devices to supplement oxygen administration and know when and how to use them.
- On a manikin, demonstrate the proper sizing, insertion, and follow-up for the use of an oropharyngeal airway.
- Demonstrate the proper use and application of a manual suction device in the treatment of a victim who is vomiting or who has fluid in the upper airway.
- Identify methods to keep themselves safe and use resources that are available on hand

The Kinesiology department mandates that to receive credit for a practicum course students must attend and actively participate in a minimum of 80% of the classes for the course. Students who miss more than two classes will not pass this course.
