General Description: A survey of the field of psychology introducing basic terms, concepts and methods. Included are topics such as biological basis of behaviour, learning, perception, motivation, cognition, child development, personality, abnormal and social psychology.

Prerequisite or corequisite: NONE

Evaluation:

As indicated on the schedule, there will be four equally weighted exams counting for 70% (based on the assigned readings, videos and lectures), Assignment 10% URPP participation 4% and 16% for in-class testing (clickers).

Grading: Grades are not negotiable. There will be no extra assignments. The grading scheme for the course conforms to the 9-point grading system used in undergraduate programs at York (e.g., A+ = 9, A = 8, B+ = 7, C+ = 5, etc.). Assignment Submission: Proper academic performance depends on students doing their work not only well, but on time.
