Course Description:

A survey of higher-order cognitive processes in humans. Topics include attention, memory, problem solving, thinking and language.

Evaluation and Grading Schemes:

1. **Three tests** will be counted for the final course score. Tests are based on text, lectures and video presentations. Exams can be multiple choices, T/F, short answers, definitions and essays.
2. Participation means attending classes, participate in class discussions, participation in scheduled tests and assignment, academic honesty and other good behaviours. There will be a reduction of participation marks if a student does not refrain from disturbing other students during video presentation, lack of participation as described above, and any other dishonest and disrespectful behaviour either in class or in emails. Students will be expected to maintain civility and mutual respect.

Policy for Missed Tests

1. The student *must contact the Teaching Assistant Sarah D'Amour and copy to the Course Director* either in person or email *within 24 hours before or after* the test. In your email, you must state your name, student number, and the reason you cannot take the test.

The student must show appropriate documentation to Sarah who is in charge of make-up tests. The documentation must verify the circumstances for the missed test.

A legitimately recognized reason for missing a test is a medical one. Test missed on the grounds of *medical conditions must be supported by an attending physician's statement Form*. The form could be downloaded from the Registrar's Office

The document MUST state that the student is incapacitated to an extent that taking the test on the date of the test is not possible. The department of Psychology encourages Course Directors to verify suspicious student claims with the physicians directly. Failure to provide appropriate documentation will result in a grade of "0%" for the missed test.

2. We apologize ahead of time if the make-up test and date is inconvenient for you. All make-up tests will be held approximately one week following the original test date. You will be informed of the time and location of the exam by Sarah, the Teaching Assistant. Only one offer of make-up test date per student per test.

Missing more than one test in the original date will trigger an investigation and may result in 0% for the second missed test.

3. ***Non-medical circumstances must be supported by appropriate documentation (i.e. death certificates, or obituary notice in the case of attending funeral for a close relative, and your birth certificates etc. to prove your relationship to the deceased).***
4. If any of the test dates specified in this syllabus is in conflict with a particular *religious holiday*, please email the Teaching Assistant and copy to the Course Director in the first three weeks of class. The claim will be checked against the list of recognized religious holidays.
