Course Description

This course explores the development of children with a focus on infancy. We will examine both physical and psychological (including emotional, cognitive, and social) changes over this period. The most prominent theoretical frameworks, and major advances in the research literature will be explored. Topics will include the influence of the environment, genetic influences, as well as developmental psychopathology.

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. Demonstrate in-depth knowledge in the psychology of infancy.
2. Articulate trends in infant psychology.

3. Express knowledge of infant psychology in written form
4. Describe and explain limits to generalizability of research findings on infant development.
5. Demonstrate ability to relate information the psychology of infancy to own and others' life experiences.

Description of Assignments

The midterm will contain 60 multiple choice questions. The final exam will contain 60 multiple choice questions and essay questions.

The term paper will be on a topic of your interest related to infant development. It will approximately 5-7pages in length (excluding references). More instructions will be posted on eclass.

Class Format and Attendance Policy

The class is fully in-person. Attendance is up to the student but all exams and the paper will require information that is presented in class.

Grading as per Senate Policy
