1. A SEARCH FOR INDIVIDUALISM AND COLLECTIVISM

Assignment #3: A GLOBAL VIEW OF PSYCHOLOGY

Most of what is published in psychology journals and textbooks takes a Western perspective (or Western indigenous perspective) and ignores the psychologies that have been developed by scholars across the globe to address concerns relevant to their own cultures. The purpose of this activity is twofold. First, it will acquaint you with

some of the research interests of psychologists outside of Western Europe, the United States, Canada, and Australia. Second, it will encourage you to think about some of the influences on what is considered Western psychology.*

Directions: For this activity you are asked to search a psychology database (such as PsycLIT or PsycINFO) to locate a journal article that focuses on research developed in a "non-Western" context. Such articles are often categorized under the heading of indigenous psychology.

1. Provide the complete citation for your article (see references at the end of activities in this book for examples of citation format and content).
2. In a paragraph or two, summarize this study. Include a description of the purpose of the study, participants, procedures, and results. Identify the underlying theory of human nature. Support your view.
