Written Assignment: The assignment will consist of the following essay style question to be answered in 2000 to 3000 words (approximately 10 pages). The essay should be typed, double-spaced, and written in accordance with the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association APA style. This manual is available in the library and the bookstore or you can go to http://www.apastyle.org/learn/tutorials/basics-tutorial.aspx for online tutorial. Students are expected to work independently on this assignment. There will be a penalty of 5% (half letter grade) for each day late. Any students who have not done a great deal of writing to date may want to contact the Centre for Academic Writing (329 Ross) as soon as possible. In addition, there are several writing resources posted on the York University website.

Essay question: Chose a therapy method, describe it <u>succinctly</u> and tell me what it is about this theory that appeals to you **personally** (or not).

Due date: Two weeks after each seminar presentation.
