Course Description:

We discuss findings in psychology as the methods that psychologists use to unravel the mysteries of human behaviour. Topics include the biological bases of behaviour, learning, memory, perception, intelligence, motivation and emotion, development across the lifespan, personality, health psychology, psychological disorders and psychotherapy.

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Define psychology and explain how it meets the criteria of science.
- 2. Recognize key concepts, methods, theories and assumptions in psychology.
- 3. Describe basic characteristics of the scientific method in psychology.
- 4. Discern differences between personal views and scientific evidence.

Specific Learning Objectives

Students will be able to understand and explain human behaviour from biological, evolutionary, learning, developmental and sociocultural perspectives. Furthermore, they will be able to

integrate these perspectives and appreciate how heredity, environment, body and mind interact to shape human behavior.
