#### **Course Description**

This seminar course focuses on the various approaches to the study of cognitive processes in non-human animal species. The course includes the study of memory, problem-solving, concept formation, the representation of time and number and language acquisition in nonhuman animals.

- 1. Demonstrate in-depth knowledge of comparative cognition.
- 2. Critically evaluate, synthesize and resolve conflicting results of comparative cognition.
- 3. Articulate trends in the psychology of comparative cognition.
- 4. Locate research articles on comparative cognition and show critical thinking about research findings.
- 5. Express knowledge of comparative cognition in written form.

- 6. Engage in evidence-based dialogue with course director and peers.
- 7. Demonstrate an ability to work with others.

### **Specific Learning Objectives**

- Describe and explain key concepts and research findings in animal cognition.
- Distinguish among evolutionary, functional, causal, and developmental questions about behaviour.
- Use library resources to locate current relevant research findings.
- Use APA style.
- Critically evaluate concepts and theories in comparative cognition.
- Summarize the rationale, results and conclusions of a scientific journal article in the field.
- Formulate testable hypotheses about comparative cognition.
- Communicate ideas and research-based evidence orally, through class discussion. a scientific poster presentation and in writing.

### **Required Text**

• Animal Cognition: Evolution, Behavior and Cognition (2013) by Clive Wynne and Monique Udell (publishers: Palgrave Macmillan)

The text will be supplemented with scientific journal articles, as relevant.

## **Description of Assignments**

Assignments will be short (one to two pages, maximum) and based on learning practical skills (library searches, APA style, etc.). The final paper will be either a critical literature review or a research proposal, based on the theories learned in class. The poster presentation will be based on your final paper.
