Course Description

This course introduces the student to theory, concepts & methods in psychology. A variety of topics will be covered including factors which contribute to the development, structure and dynamics of personality. Psychoanalytic, Trait and Behavioural and Biological approaches will be the main focus. A review of relevant research both within and outside of the field will be undertaken.
