Course Format

This is an online course (with exams held in-person, on York University Keele Campus). All lectures will be livestreamed on Wednesday's from 12:00-14:30 using the online platform YouTube. The livestream link can be found on the Moodle course website each week.

Simply click on the link (found on Moodle) and it will bring you to the live stream.

All livestreamed lectures will be recorded and posted on Moodle to view at your convenience. However, the livestream will have live chat that will allow you to ask questions, clarification, or engage in classroom discussion. Thus, there are advantages to attending the livestream. There is no attendance requirement for livestreams.

Course Description

This course is designed to provide you with a detailed introduction to major theories, research, and trends in the field of social psychology. Social psychology can be defined as "the scientific study of people's thoughts, feelings, and behaviours regarding themselves and the actual, imagined, or implied presence of others". Throughout this course, we will cover a wide range of topics of interest to social psychologists (and hopefully yourself!) including social cognition (how we think about ourselves and others), obedience and conformity, persuasion, intimacy and close relationships, and physical attraction.

Program Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate broad knowledge of social determinants of behaviour.
- 2. Describe and evaluate current theory and research in social psychology.
- 3. Understand and interpret principles of social psychology in everyday life.
- 4. Define causes of social behaviour from different perspectives.

Specific Learning Objectives

The first goal of this course is to provide you with the opportunity to learn more about the field of social psychology. We will examine how people influence, and are influenced by their social environments and how seemingly minor changes in the social situation can have an important effect on individuals' thoughts, feelings, and behaviours. A second goal is to learn and understand how the scientific method is applied to, and become a critical consumer of, social psychological research. A third goal is to gain insight into yourself and those around you.

Description of Assignments

Mid-Term Exams: 60 multiple choice questions (75-minutes each)

Final Exam: 60 multiple choice questions, two short answer questions (2 of 3). Short answer questions will be related to the assigned in-class videos (2-hours).

Missed Tests/Midterm Exams/Late Assignment:

In addition to the online form, students documented reason for missed tests, midterm exam or late assignments such as illness, compassionate grounds, etc., MUST submit official documentation (e.g. <u>Attending Physician Statement</u>).

IMPORTANT

There will be **no make-up exams**, except under *extraordinary* circumstances. If you miss an exam with no legitimate excuse, **you will receive a grade of zero**. If you have a legitimate reason (e.g., severe illness, etc.) for being absent from an exam, and have documentation to verify your absence, you may take a make-up exam in lieu of the missed exam.

Please note that I am extremely strict about the conditions that will allow you to write a make-up examination – nonetheless, you should contact the TA regardless of your reason if you have or will miss an examination. You must contact the TA within 48 hours of the exam and provide documentation in order to be permitted to take a make-up exam.

In the case of an emergency, email you TA(s) as soon as possible (CC: Professor). In this email, please (a) outline the reason for your absence, and (b) confirm that you have medical or other relevant documentation to support this reason, (c) provide all identifying information (e.g., full name, student number, course section, etc.).

IT IS IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN MUST BE WILLING TO STATE THAT YOU WERE MEDICALLY UNABLE TO TAKE THE EXAM AT THE SPECIFIC TIME THE EXAM WAS HELD AND YOU MUST PRODUCE THE DOCUMENT WITHIN 48 HOURS OF THE MISSED EXAM AND EMAIL YOUR TA (AND COURSE INSTRUCTOR) OR TELEPHONE THE PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT IN ADVANCE OF THE EXAM IF YOU KNOW THAT YOU WILL BE UNABLE TO TAKE. YOU MUST ALSO COMPLETE THE ONLINE FORM WITHIN 48 HOURS FOR THE UNDERGRADUATE PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT TO REVIEW.

If you are very ill or facing extreme personal circumstances and are unable to get the required documentation, I highly recommend that you consider dropping the course.
