Course Description

This course provides an overview of the etiology, symptomology, and treatment of the major clinical disorders. Students will be asked to consider the historically and socially constructed nature of mental illness. The examination of neurotic, psychotic, and personality disorders, as well as some developmental problems will also be covered. Additionally, identity problems, anxiety conditions, and learned (phobias, substance abuse, cultural deprivation, etc.) patterns of abnormal behaviour will be studied. Overall, this course is designed to provide you with an introduction to adult psychopathology and to develop your ability to think critically about issues pertaining to mental health.

Program Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate in-depth knowledge of abnormal psychology.
- 2. Articulate trends in abnormal psychology.
- 3. Express knowledge of abnormal psychology in written form
- 4. Describe and explain limits to generalizability of research findings in abnormal psychology.
- 5. Demonstrate ability to relate information in abnormal psychology to own and others' life experiences.


Specific Learning Objectives

- 1) Defining and understanding the relatively fluid concept of abnormality and how both historical underpinnings and ongoing research continues to impact on this concept
- 2) Demonstrate knowledge of the history and current status of major paradigms in abnormal psychology, including the concepts and methods of each paradigm, as applied to the assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of abnormality
- 3) Will be given an opportunity to apply diagnostic criteria and examine how the disorder(s) developed, in addition to learning about current treatment methods

Description of Workshop Reflections Worth: 10% of final grade

There will be two workshop written reflections that are worth 5% each. In order for students to be able to discuss and reflect on some of the course material in more detail, smaller zoom workshops with approximately 30 to 35 students will be held *the week of July 6th* (Workshop #1) and the *week of July 13* (Workshop #2).

The workshops will take place during the last hour of class time, from 4:30 to 5:30pm. You will be sent a separate invite with a separate link to join your particular workshop section. *You cannot switch workshop sections!* If you complete a workshop from another section, you will receive a grade of zero. During the workshop, you will engage in some sort of task – for example you will apply some of the concepts from a previous class to an applied situation or you may watch a short video and the workshop leader will post a couple of questions and moderate the class discussion on the topic. At the end of the workshop, the workshop leader will post the reflection question to answer. You will have until 10am the next morning to complete the workshop reflection and submit it via Turnitin on moodle.

Some more information regarding the workshops and reflections will be presented during Lecture 1.

Description of Test

Worth: each Test is worth 30% of final grade

Test 1 and Test 2 will consist strictly of multiple-choice questions based on class lecture slides, videos shown during lectures, as well as any demonstrations/discussions that take place during lecture and also textbook readings. Test 1 will be based on all lecture material and textbook readings assigned from Lectures 1 (June 30). to Lecture 6 (July 16). Testing for Test 1 will happen using Moodle. Further information regarding Test 1 will be discussed during Lecture 1 and updates will be provided under "Course Announcements" on moodle.

Description of Case Study Assignment Worth: 30% of final grade

You will be assigned one of two case studies and asked to provide DSM-V diagnosis(es). In addition, you will be asked to provide a rationale for your diagnosis(es), how you ruled out particular disorders, and explain from one model of psychotherapy how you believe the person developed their diagnosis(es). The case studies and assignment instructions will be posted on moodle on Wednesday, July 8, 2020. The case study assignment will be due by Friday, July 31st, 2020, by 11:59pm, via Turnitin. More information regarding case study assignment will be discussed during Lecture 1. If you submit your assignment after the deadline, you will receive a 10% lateness penalty per day the assignment

BONUS MARK: Participation in the Undergraduate Research Participant Pool (URPP): Potential to earn an additional 2%!

The URPP is the Department of Psychology's participant recruitment pool. Students' can earn marks to their overall grade in PSYC3140M (2%) based on participation in research via URPP. To earn the full 2%:

- **Participate in 4 hours of research** during the URPP Summer Term (June 29 th August 12 th, 2020)
- Each 30-minute of research participation = 0.5 URPP Credit.
- A grade out of 2% will be calculated according to number of credits earned (out of 4).

Note: We recommend participating in research ASAP. Studies are posted throughout the term, but those who leave their URPP participation until the last-minute may be unable to earn full credits due to simple supply and demand.
