Course Description

The study of perception involves a complex combination of physiology, psychophysics, and cognition. In this course we will explore the major sensory systems focussing primarily on vision and hearing, using these topics as a framework.

Throughout the course, issues will be explored from an experimental perspective. Therefore, in some lectures we will cover the fundamental experimental paradigms used to study perception (psychophysics). Over the course of the term we will discuss different sensory

systems in turn; in each instance time will be spent describing the stimulus (sound, smell taste), the physiology of the receptors and subsequent cortical areas that are activated.

Very often what we perceive results not only from the information gathered by our sensory systems, but from our expectations and prior knowledge about the world we inhabit. As a result we will also study cognitive influences on perception and how they are identified and assessed.

- Demonstrate in-depth knowledge in sensation and perception.
- Articulate trends in the psychology of sensation and perception.
- Express knowledge of sensation and perception in written form.
- Describe and explain limits to generalizability of research findings in sensation and perception.
- Demonstrate ability to relate information about sensation and perception to own and others' life experiences.

Specific Learning Objectives

A related, and important, aim is to provide a deeper understanding of how scientific methods are used to study perceptual processes. You will eventually be able to think through a perceptual experiment, understand the methodology used, and why.
