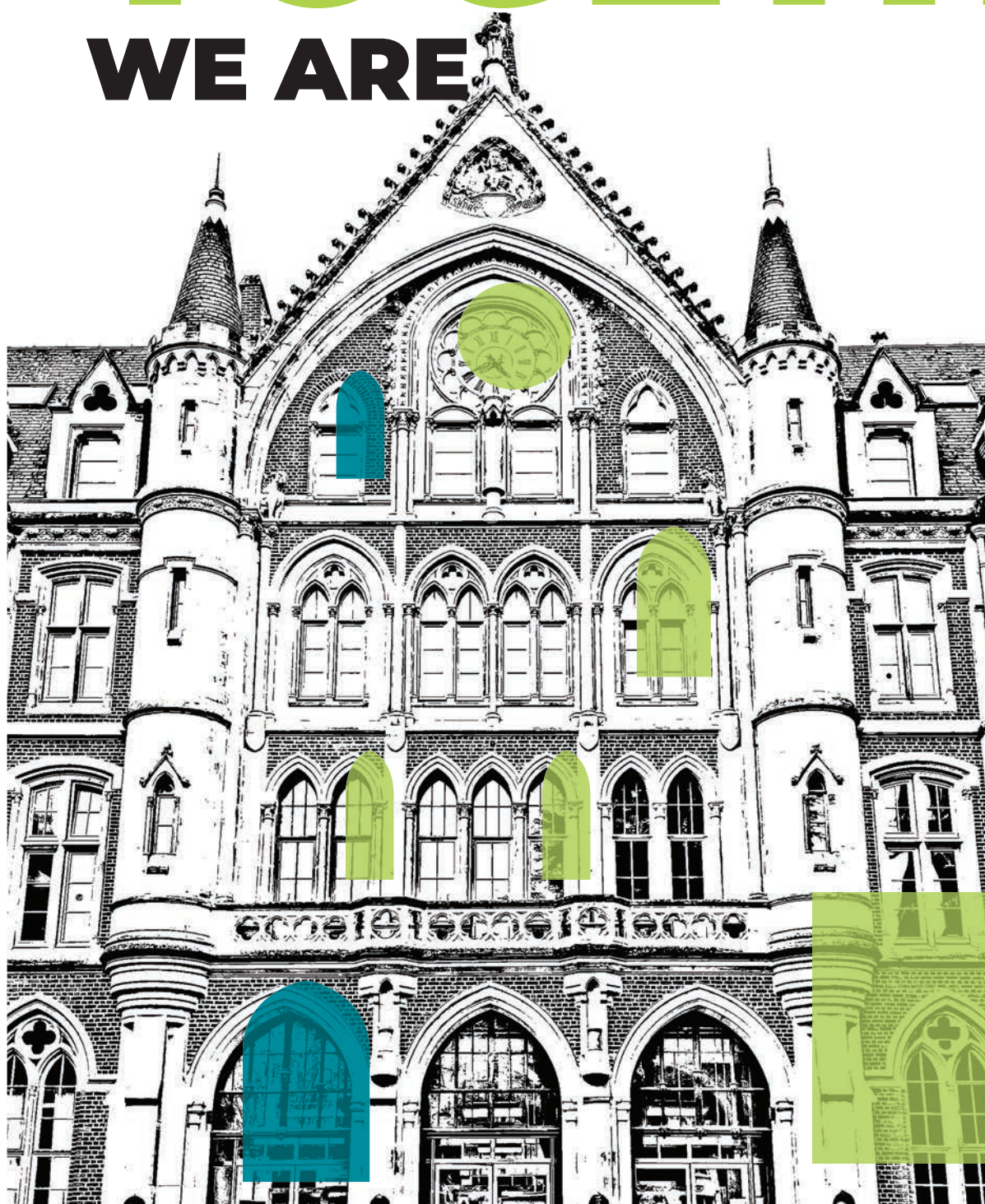

Live TREE is the energy and societal transition programme of the Université catholique de Lille. Live TREE crosses disciplines and functions of the University to experiment on energy, mobility, waste management, nature in the city, social participation and new economic models. #Livetree



A UNIVERSITY AT THE FOREFRONT OF INNOVATION

Many initiatives have been launched to break with traditional methods, such as the teaching bus, hybrid mobility, LockLab, LearningLab, test terrace, etc.

Our medicine teaching for example, combines traditional methods (blackboard diagrams and cadaveric dissection) with pedagogical innovations. Examples in medicine: body painting, 3D printing, virtual dissection, 4 high-tech computer-controlled mannequins, an ultrasound simulator, an Anatomage® table, a state-of-the-art 3D visualization and virtual dissection tool.

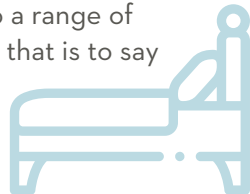
SPORT

A gymnasium is reserved for students of the faculties of the Université Catholique de Lille. It is open 6 days a week, programming various group activities as well as providing free access to the gym and its equipment.



ACCOMMODATION

The university's accommodation service, the Association d'Entraide Universitaire (ALL), gives students access to a range of 21 university residences, that is to say 1,200 rooms (prices ranging from €240 to €550 per month).



HEALTH

The University hospital, the Centre Polyvalent de Santé Universitaire (CPSU), is open all week and provides consultations in general medicine and gynaecology, nursing care, relaxation therapy workshops and psychological counselling.



STUDENTS ASSOCIATIONS

The quality of the student life is one of the greatest assets of our faculty. There are many varied activities to choose from, each contributing not just to the personal fulfillment of the students but also to the overall atmosphere of the campus. Each year new associations are created. There are now 115 on our campus.





CATERING

A university restaurant is open for lunch and dinner in the heart of the campus. It offers varied and balanced menus. The campus also offers a wide variety of restaurants, fast food outlets and grocery stores.

LIBRARY



Vauban Library is open from Monday to Friday: 8.30 AM to 8.00 PM. + Saturday: 8.30AM to 5PM and is an excellent place to study, carry out research or borrow documents. It is accessible to all students of the university, to professor-researchers and administrative personnel of the Université Catholique de Lille. Our Library is also available online.
