# ACCOMMODATION

**All our accommodation is located on or very near campus and is centred around our colleges. Each college has a welcoming, supportive community, so you will soon feel at home.**

## **Additional requirements**

We have rooms suitable for students with health or disability requirements.

## **Costs**

Single, self-catered rooms cost from £99 to £200 per week, with catered rooms available from £135 to £208 per week (note prices may change). Rent is usually paid in two instalments (one per semester).

## **What are my room options?**

### **Price bands**

Prices reflect the age and size of the accommodation, as well as the number of people sharing kitchen and bathroom facilities.

### **Catered or self-catered**

We offer self-catering and catered options. Both include access to a shared kitchen.

### **En-suite or shared bathroom**

Our rooms either have an en-suite bathroom or they have a washbasin in the room with access to a shared bathroom.

### **Let lengths**

Whether you're joining us for a full academic year or just a semester, we'll try our best to match your let lengths to your study period as closely as possible.





### What is included?

- Bedroom, shared kitchen and shared bathroom or en-suite
- Wifi and wired internet in every bedroom
- Shared kitchens are cleaned once a week and shared bathrooms are cleaned on weekdays
- Electricity, heating, water, and contents insurance
- 24-hour campus security presence.

### Living off campus

There is a wide selection of private sector accommodation within walking distance of the University. Rents vary and usually do not include bills for water, electricity, heating or internet access.

You will be a member of one of our 11 colleges throughout your time here. # SUPPORT AND WELLBEING

**Our support network is here if you need it and we offer dedicated services for international students.**



## International student support

We will help you settle in through a range of orientation events and support. We offer a free collection service from Manchester Airport for Semester 1 starters, a Welcome Week for new students, and academic study skills courses and workshops. We also provide immigration advice, specialist support for international students, facilities for practising your faith, and much more. You can also get to know other students through the student-run International Students' Association.

## College team

Staff at your college will provide confidential support to help you manage the transition to university life and studies at York.

## Academic supervisor

A member of your teaching department will act as your supervisor. You'll meet regularly throughout your course. They'll advise you on your academic progress and support your personal development.

## Students with children

Our Family Network will help you meet, socialise, share information and advice, and have fun with other parents.

## Students with a disability

We can arrange academic support and adjustments if you have a disability or long-term health condition that has an impact on your ability to study. Disability Advisers offer support, advice and guidance to students with a diagnosed disability.

## Study support

We provide a range of services and resources to help you develop the skills you need for academic success. From one-to-one sessions with our tutors at the Writing Centre, to help understanding maths and statistics at the Maths Skills Centre.

## Togetherall

All students have access to free 24/7 online mental health and wellbeing support with Togetherall. If you struggle to sleep, feel low, stressed or unable to cope, Togetherall can help you get support, take control and feel better.

## Open Door team

Open Door is a team of mental health practitioners providing support to students who are experiencing psychological or mental health difficulties. It is a completely free self-referral service available to all students.

## Independent advice

### Students' Unions (YUSU)

If you need guidance relating to your course or personal matters you can talk to staff in the Students' Union Advice and Support Centre (ASC) and the Graduate Students' Association's Advice Service.

### Nightline

Nightline is run by trained student volunteers and provides a confidential listening and information service for students from 8pm to 8am during term time.

### Chaplaincy

The Christian chaplains at the University are available to people of all faiths and none. There is also a network of contacts from other world faiths and dedicated spaces for prayer and reflection on campus.

### Health services

The health centre closest to campus, Unity Health, offers GP appointments, a repeat prescription service and walk-in clinics.

# PREPARATION AND ARRIVAL

**Once you've accepted your place there are a few things you need to know before you arrive.**

## Before you leave home

### Visa information

Check the type of visa that you need to study in the UK. If you require a student visa you can apply for your visa from three months before your course start date. We can also provide support with your application, see [york.ac.uk/immigration](http://york.ac.uk/immigration)

### Healthcare

You will need to pay an immigration health surcharge if you require a student visa. This entitles you to receive free health services from the National Health Service (NHS). On arrival at York you can register with a doctor/general practitioner (GP) at Unity Health, next to campus. If you require medical treatment in the UK, a full up-to-date vaccination record (in English, if possible) will help you get the best care possible. There are additional charges for dental treatments available on the NHS. There is no health surcharge if you come to the UK on a Standard Visitor Visa, but we recommend that you have your own health insurance in place.

## Arriving at York

### Airports

We recommend that you arrive at Manchester Airport, if possible. We offer a free Manchester Airport collection service for Semester 1 starters, where you will be

welcomed by University staff and students. You can book your place online after completing enrolment. Alternatively, you can get a train from the airport which takes one and a half hours. Other nearby airports are Leeds-Bradford and Newcastle International.



### The first week

During the first week of Semester 1, the University of York Students' Union (YUSU) and colleges organise activities and events to help new undergraduates settle in. The week before Semester 1 starts there is a postgraduate welcome organised by the Graduate Students' Association (GSA). There are also different events specifically for international students.

During Welcome Week, you will be invited to a Visiting Student Orientation and an Icebreaker Social. Colleges and Departments also hold welcome events.

If you are joining us at another point in the year, you can check with your Department to see what you can get involved with.



## Semester dates

From September 2023, our academic year will be split into two 16-week semesters.

A vacation in each semester gives you two or three weeks away from your studies to revise and relax.

18 September 2023 – 2 February 2024

Christmas vacation:

18 December 2023 – 5 January 2024

### Semester 2:

5 February 2024 – 7 June 2024

Easter vacation:

25 March 2024 – 5 April 2024

### Moving to the UK

International student Yan shares her top tips to help you prepare for studying in the UK.

**Weather:** If you don't know already, it can rain quite a bit in the UK. But most of the time it's just drizzle. Therefore, instead of umbrellas, I would recommend bringing some hooded waterproof coats to deal with the weather.

**Transport:** If you are planning to visit other places whilst you are studying in the UK, remember to apply for a 16-25 Railcard! You can enjoy a discount on most rail fares.

**Homesickness:** Making yourself busy is definitely a way to deal with homesickness. I had one kind of weird way to deal with it, which was to bring some of my favorite local snacks. So remember to pack some of them in your luggage.

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## Pre-sessional English courses

### Unconditional offer

Short courses are available if you have an unconditional offer but want to practice your English language skills. You'll learn new study skills and get to know the University before you start your studies.

### Conditional offer

We also offer tailored courses for visiting students who need to meet a language condition for entry to a degree-level course. The length of the course you need to take depends on your current IELTS scores and the English language requirements for the subjects you wish to study.

### More information

If you're applying for a pre-sessional English language course and require a Student visa, you must take a UK government-approved Secure English Language Test. Only IELTS for UKVI (Academic) or Trinity ISE can be accepted for entry to pre-sessional courses.

After you have accepted your offer to study at York, we will confirm which pre-sessional course you should apply to online via You@York.

You must provide the following supporting documents along with your application:

- Academic transcript from your home university
- Name and email address of a referee or a letter of recommendation from your home university
- English language certificate. You will need a recognised English language certificate if English is not your first language
- Some departments may ask you to submit additional supporting materials with your application
- Postgraduate research students will also need to supply a research proposal of 250–300 words.

## 5 Complete your application

Submit an online application and upload your supporting documents via You@York, our online application management system.

## 6 Track your application

Track your application, upload supporting documents and receive information online via You@York.

## 7 Accept your offer

Accept your place at York using You@York.

## 8 Apply for your visa

If you require a student visa to study in the UK, you will need a Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS). You can only apply for your CAS once you have accepted your place at York.

## 9 Enrol online

After you have accepted your offer, we will email you about how to set up your University of York IT account and how to complete enrolment.

## 10 Prepare to join us at York

We'll email you about what you need to do before you get here. Find out more at [york.ac.uk/international-new](http://york.ac.uk/international-new)

If you are applying to a research degree you should visit department web pages and contact potential supervisors to discuss research areas before you apply. This will help to ensure a proper match between you and your prospective supervisor.

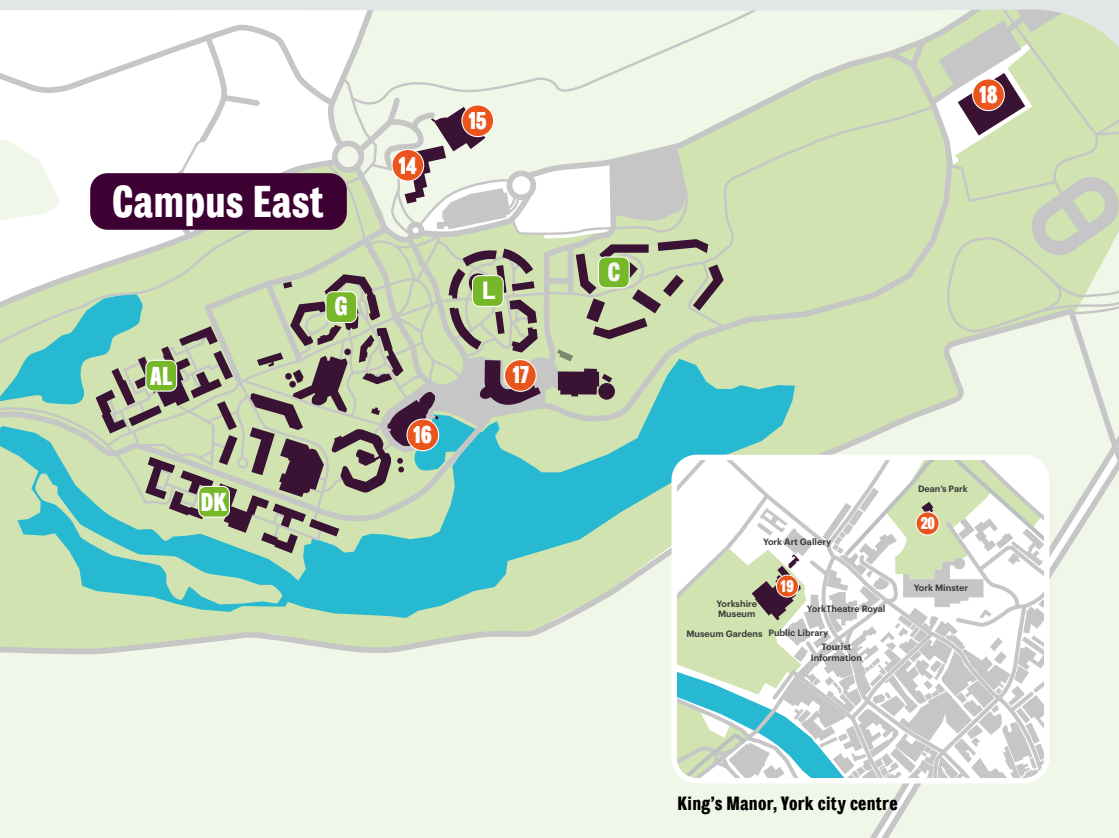
