Plan Your Future at York

2. ASK QUESTIONS! At your appointment, make sure you ask questions to further understand what it is that you need to graduate with your degree by a given date.
3. Know your prerequisites and make sure you complete those in time to take the upper year courses that follow.
4. Start mapping out how you can make it happen. Are you a full time student? What is your timeline?
5. Start mapping out your degree plan. (Write out your mandatory courses, pre-requisites, electives and Gen Ed's!)
