Changes to Existing Degrees/Certificates

International Bachelor of Arts (iBA) – European Studies
Effective session of change: Fall 2015

Revisions to the International Bachelor of Arts include an addition of a required course, reduction of internationally-oriented credits completed outside the major and exemptions to the language component.

Rationale

This change means that the degree will provide 12 credits of internationally-oriented content (ANTH 2300 3.0 and 9 credits) in a different way. This change fosters development of skills essential for effective participation and leadership within global experiences. Additionally, the new course creates small cohorts that will have at least one course together.

The revisions are in alignment with the faculty's priority of internationalization, which is the active pursuit of activities which support the incorporation of an international perspective into all aspects of teaching and learning. This minor change is recommended by the Office of the Dean, LA&PS with consultation with IBA coordinators.

The addition of ANTH 2300 3.0 is based on intercultural learning, a key component to internationalization, where learning abroad involves exposure to and increased understanding of cultures other than the student's own. *As part of the national international education strategy, educational institutions are asked to develop international competency among Canadian university students so they become globally aware, understand cultural differences and learn how to interact cross-culturally.*

With the flexibility of the program, IBA students tend to navigate without contact among other IBA colleagues. In order to encourage students to complete their study abroad requirement, the intercultural course creates collegiality among other IBA students and provides intercultural training in preparation for their international academic exchange. This course is considered outside the major, even for ANTH students.

Students will:

- 1) understand abstract and concrete differences between "home" and "abroad".
- 2) develop the ability to recognize, analyze and understand multiple cultural viewpoints
- 3) be able to negotiate different modes of cultural communication
- 4) develop the ability to behave appropriately and effectively in intercultural situations

Exemptions to the language component are based on the consideration of language competence of an admitted IBA student, fluent in more than one language. Secondly, the availability of advanced-level credits in all of York’s language courses may leave students with a limited number of credits to complete elsewhere. As one of the faculty’s priorities involves study abroad, an umbrella term referring to any for-credit learning activity abroad, the exemption provides the option to complete on a Letter of Permission or as part of an academic exchange.

Streams

In areas where curricular resources suffice, students completing a major or minor in European studies may focus on a national stream of any of the EU member states (e.g. France), a regional stream (e.g. Scandinavia), as well as the European Union itself. Subject to the approval of the program coordinator, students who successfully complete at least 18 credits within such a stream will qualify to have this curricular focus noted on their transcript. Thus, a student might graduate within political science and European studies (focus: Greece) or Italian studies and European studies (focus: Italy), or history and European studies (focus: Spain). Students who choose not to focus on a particular stream would graduate with a degree in the relevant major and a major or a minor in European studies.

Study Abroad

Students in European studies are strongly encouraged, although not required, to spend at least one academic term studying at a European university. The level of language facility generally required is equivalent to completion of at least the intermediate level and students are encouraged to achieve such a level. Subject to the coordinator's approval, as well as letter of permission, study abroad, transfer credit and residency requirements, courses successfully completed on such exchanges will be accepted for credit towards the major/minor and, if applicable, towards the stream in European studies.

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Bachelor of Public Administration (H)(SP) - School of Public Policy and Administration

Effective session of change: Fall 2015

The School of Public Policy and Administration is proposing the following changes:

- Add a new 3-credit required course to the core at the 2000 level: AP/PPAS 2195 3.0 Professional Skills and Communication
- Drop the graduation requirement of 5.5 GPA in the major, leaving the 5.0 cumulative GPA requirement unchanged.
- Add the requirement of AP/PPAS 4320 3.0 Program Evaluation II (existing course) to the already required AP/PPAS 4310 3.0 Program Evaluation I in the Management and Policy Analysis Streams.

Rationale

1. SPPA offers a number of intensive experiential education (EE) opportunities in courses at the 3000 and 4000 level and eligible BPA students also have access to paid internship opportunities through the York Career Centre. Nevertheless, when on occasion students fail to exhibit strong communication and inter-personal skills (despite screening by GPA and through a personal interview), our ability to provide EE opportunities for current and future students is put in jeopardy. Our students represent SPPA and the University to external partners in the public sector (typically one of Ontario's ministries) and among not-for-profit organizations, and we need to ensure that they have the knowledge and skills to excel in professional environments. The new course AP/PPAS 2195 3.0 Professional Skills and Communication should also enhance our students' potential to be competitive in the labour market for internships and full-time employment opportunities, ultimately enhancing the School's profile in the long run. The course will fit well at the 2000-level since our course offerings and degree requirements are relatively sparse at this level. Also the reduction in the number of general education credits from 24 to 21 creates room for this additional 3-credit course in the major without reducing the number of free choice credits left for BPA students to date.
2. We are proposing to abandon the graduation requirement of 5.5 GPA in the major because it has become increasingly clear that the Registrar's Office (RO) cannot guarantee the accuracy of its calculation for an interdisciplinary program such as the BPA. Which courses constitute part of the major or outside the major changes by stream in the BPA Spec. Honours and also relative to the BPA Honours option, while the Student Information System (SIS) only has the capability to capture one definition of what constitutes part of the major for all BPA program options. SIS can accommodate GPA calculations in the major for the BAS degree for example, but not for the

interdisciplinary BPA programs that span a number of course rubrics and free choice under these non-PPAS course rubrics. It follows that some students may not have a correct calculation for their GPA in the major (depending on their choice of stream and/or the courses they take), and the only way we can ensure the equitable treatment of all BPA majors is by dropping the graduation requirement of min. 5.5 GPA in the major. The remaining graduation requirement of min. 5.0 overall cumulative GPA is standard across Honours programs.

Nevertheless, we would like to emphasize that this proposal should not be viewed as an easing of academic standards, since we will continue to encourage our students to aim for higher than minimum GPA through a range of incentives and positive re-enforcements, including:

- The existing requirement of min. 6.0 overall cumulative GPA for eligibility for the paid internship opportunities through the Career Centre and competition for placements in AP/PPAS 4995 6.0 Practicum in Public Administration.
- Actively reaching out to students with a shortfall in GPA and inviting them for one-on-one advising appointments to address their academic warning conditions and strategies for success. We have implemented this practice in Fall 2013 and it is facilitated by the placement of an LAPS Advisor at SPPA.

We plan to check students' GPA twice a year after the completion of the Winter and Summer terms.

- Introducing the new core required course AP/PPAS 2195 3.0 Professional Skills and Communication should also help instill strong academic aspirations. The course will include tutorials for small group interactions with faculty, and thus allow us to monitor better the progress of individual students.

If these positive re-enforcement strategies prove successful, we may revise the graduation requirement of min. 5.0 overall cumulative GPA upward in the future.

3. AP/PPAS 4310 3.0 and AP/PPAS 4320 3.0 Program Evaluation I and II have a significant EE component since students work on the same program evaluation project with partner organizations (typically one of Ontario's ministries or a non-profit organization) through the Fall and Winter terms respectively. We encourage students to complete both courses, but since only AP/PPAS 4310 3.0 is currently required in the Management and Policy Analysis streams in the BPA Spec. Honours, sometimes students drop AP/PPAS 4320 3.0. Abandoning a project mid-course has a negative impact on our reputation and the ability to secure EE projects with our external partners for future student cohorts. As a result, we propose that AP/PPAS 4320 3.0 be required whenever AP/PPAS 4310 3.0 is. This will not increase the number of required credits in the affected streams as adding AP/PPAS 4320 3.0 will be simply offset by reducing the number of free choice credits under the PPAS course rubric at the 3000 or 4000 level.

For further clarification, the BPA was launched in 2010 with a vision to have a large program. Since then the strategic direction of the School has changed to focus on a smaller number of high-achieving majors, thus closing the 90 credit BPA option and focusing on Honours students only. With the originally envisioned large program, we would not have been able to provide EE opportunities for all of our majors, hence planned to offer different sections of AP/PPAS 4310 3.0 with and without an EE component, with the majority of students only completing non-EE sections of AP/PPAS 4310 3.0, and hence there was no need to require or offer multiple sections of AP/PPAS 4320 3.0. The current situation is quite different with only one section of the two program evaluation courses on offer and with a substantial EE component, there is the possibility and need to require students in the Management and Policy Analysis streams to complete both AP/PPAS 4310 3.0 and AP/PPAS 4320 3.0. This will enhance the students' learning outcomes in evaluation implementation and data analysis as well as their CVs with tangible EE projects fully completed.

Italian Studies is proposing to:

1. AP/IT 3001 3.0 and AP/IT 3002 3.0 be added to the core requirements in ITALIAN STUDIES degrees.
2. AP/IT 4170 3.0 be added to the list of linguistics courses available in Italian Studies.
3. AP/IT 3050 3.0 be included in the changes for the degree (6cr to 3 cr course)

Rationale

These changes reflect the addition of 2 three credit language courses (AP/IT 3001 3.0 and IT 3002 3.0) equivalent to AP/IT 3000 6.0 (and IT 3050 6.0 and IT 3030 6.0). This was done to offer more flexibility to students (i.e. to offer the courses in different terms at 3 credits)

The addition of AP/ IT 4170 expands and refreshes our offerings in Italian Studies.

The addition of AP/IT 3050 3.0 (three credits instead of 6 cr), in line with AP/IT 3001 3.0 and AP/IT 3002 3.0, would enhance flexibility in our offerings.

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Bachelor of Arts – Professional Writing (H)(SP)

Effective session of change: Fall 2015

Proposed changes include:

1. WRIT 2710, *Grammar & Proofreading*, will now be conceptualized as an elective for students from Professional Writing or from other programs who wish to gain a theoretical understanding of grammar. PRWR 2006 3.0 (currently PRWR 3720 3.0), *Fundamentals of Editing*, a required course in the program, will place somewhat more emphasis on grammatical practice than has been the case in the past.
2. A new course, AP/WRIT 2003 6.0, *Genre for Professional Writers*, will replace AP/WRIT 2720 6.0, *Prose: Style & Argument*, as a required course at the second-year level.
3. A new required course, AP/WRIT 2004 3.0, *Writing in Digital Cultures*, will introduce students to the techniques of writing in the fastest growing area of Professional Writing.

Rationale

1. To have a 3-credit course in the second year that focuses on writing at the sentence level, and sentence-level skills are best learned in the context of editing. Consequently current *Fundamentals of Editing* course will be brought into the second-year, placing somewhat more attention on the grammatical

aspects of editing, and in that way provide a good foundation for students proceeding into the third year of the program. Our more theoretical course on grammar is well enrolled with students from outside the program, and it will remain as an option for those students and for any students within the program who wish to pursue more theoretical aspects of the subject.

2. The concept of genre has become a standard category in the field in recent years, and encompasses much of the theory and practice that was considered under the heading prose style in the past. The new course, AP/WRIT 2003 6.0, will give our students a solid introduction to the range of forms and techniques of writing they will find in the practical world of professional writing.

3. Attention to writing in digital environments has been increasing within all of our courses, and to provide a common basis for both our students and our instructors, we believe it is time to dedicate a course to writing practices for digital media. Given the pervasiveness of digital media, we anticipate adding an advanced, upper-level course in this area soon.
