Changes to Existing Degrees

**Certificate Closure – Department of Philosophy:
Closure of General Certificate in Professional Ethics**
Effective session of change: Fall 2015

The Department of Philosophy is proposing to close its General Certificate in Professional Ethics.

Rationale

The main reason, which justifies the closure of this certificate program, is its low demand. The enrolment figures show that, historically, very few students have been interested in the certificate (on average only 1-2 students graduate with the certificate each year). Also, at the CCPS meeting in 2012 when closure of the certificate was discussed, a representative from Administrative Studies noted that they have their own course on ethics and that most business degrees include a course on professional ethics taught in-house. There is, therefore, little demand from students in these professional programs for such a certificate offered by the Department of Philosophy.

**Certificate Closure – Social Science, Business and Society:
Closure of Certificate in Non-Profit Management**
Effective session of change: Fall 2015

The Department of Social Science's undergraduate program in Business and Society is proposing to close its certificate in Non-Profit Management.

Rationale

The certificate, which was originally run by the Business and Society undergraduate program, consisted of four courses, which were taught by the Schulich School of Business. In 2013, Schulich stopped offering the four required courses of the certificate. The continuation of the certificate is no longer feasible, unless LA&PS offers alternatives. However, given fiscal constraints, low enrolments, and limited in-house

expertise, the replacement of the lost courses is not an option, hence the proposal to discontinue offering the certificate.

**Bachelor of Arts – Department of Languages, Literature and Linguistics
Minor Changes to Existing Degree**

Effective session of change: Fall 2015

1. Reduction in credit number of core courses for degree requirement

The proposed change will decrease the number of required core courses for the Italian Culture degree from 18 credits to 12 credits.

Rationale

In light of the changes to the General Education requirements, one of the core courses for the Italian Culture degree, AP/IT 2751 9.0, was changed to a 1000-level General Education course for implementation in Fall/Winter 2015. This 1000-level General Education course cannot count for the core requirements in the Italian Culture major/minor. Therefore, the proposal is to request that the core courses for the Italian Culture degree be reduced to 12 credits.

The Department of Languages, Literature and Linguistics has proposed to standardize all certificates by doing the following:

- 1. Include a definition of "proficiency" in each language's calendar description.**
- 2. Include a minimum grade of B+ for ALL certificates.**
- 3. Include the requirement to complete 18 credits of language to complete the certification.**

In line with the iBA, students are required to complete 18 credits of language for the Certificate of Proficiency, if they begin at the 1000 level. To this end, a 1000-level language course has

been added to the requirements. 1000-level language has always been implied; however, it is now explicit.

4. Omission of separate written/oral exam.

No Certificate of Proficiency will require a separate written/oral exam. The final exams in courses taken at each level are sufficient.
