SUBJECT TO CHANGE	TERM	COURSE TITLE	FORMAT	BRIEF DESCRIPTION
AP/HIST 1180 6.0	SU	Making Money	ONLINE: LECT & TUTR	Explores 12 distinct but interrelated questions about money, that elusive substance with which all of us are preoccupied, but to which few us have brought great amounts of critical intellectual attention. The course examines money from a range of disciplinary perspectives, including anthropology, archaeology, economics, history, literature, political science, psychology, religious studies, and sociology, devoting two weeks to each enduring and apparently simple question. As an introduction to one of the fundamental ideas/substances of human life, the course brings interdisciplinary knowledge, breadth, and a range of scholarly approaches to a particular subject. AP/HIST 2100 6.0	SU	Ancient Greece and Rome	ONLINE: LECT & TUTR	A study of the Greek and Roman world, with particular emphasis on its social, economic and intellectual history, using primary sources archaeological, epigraphic and literary wherever possible.
AP/HIST 3160 6.0	SU	Women and Gender in Ancient Greece and Rome	ONLINE: LECT & TUTR	The course explores the social, economic, political and cultural history of women in ancient Greece and Rome. It examines Greek and Roman concepts of gender and sexuality, and considers the literary and artistic representation of women in these cultures.
AP/HIST 3395 6.0	SU	From the Defeat of Fascism to the Fall of Communism: Europe Since 1945	ONLINE: LECT & TUTR	A survey of significant themes in European history from the end of the Second World War to the present day.
AP/HIST 3670 3.0	S2	US Business History Since 1880: The Origins and Consequences of Managerial Capitalism	ONLINE: LECT & TUTR	This course explores the inception, rise, development, maturing and present state of the US economy and the changing nature of business organization. Connections with political and social change will also be emphasized.

SUBJECT TO CHANGE	TERM	COURSE TITLE	FORMAT	BRIEF DESCRIPTION
AP/HIST 1010 6.0	Y	War, Revolution & Society in the 20th Century	LECT & TUTR	A study of the major political and social upheavals which have helped to shape the contemporary world. The course will concentrate on the origins of the two World Wars and the Cold War, and on their consequences. Topics chosen for detailed examination will vary from year to year.
AP/HIST 1025 6.0	Y	Ancient North America From the Last Ice Age to European Contact	ONLINE: LECT & TUTR	This course studies the history of Indigenous people in North America from “time immemorial” to the regular settlement of Europeans in the 16th, 17th, and 18th centuries. Using a wide variety of sources it ranges from Meso-America to the High Arctic, and examines theories of the peopling of the continent; hunting, fishing and gathering; and the rise of corn civilizations.
AP/HIST 1074 6.0	Y	The Chinese Body in Cross-Cultural Perspective: Medicine, Food, and Footbinding	LECT & TUTR	This course uses the Chinese body as an entry point into the richness and complexity of daily life as it was lived and experienced in Chinese history. It focuses on two preeminent concerns in Chinese civilization—health and food—and on one of the most mysterious, widely condemned, and little understood Chinese bodily practices—footbinding.
AP/HIST 2100 6.0	Y	Ancient Greece & Rome	LECT & TUTR	A study of the Greek and Roman world, with particular emphasis on its social, economic and intellectual history, using primary sources archaeological, epigraphic and literary wherever possible.
AP/HIST 2500 6.0	Y	Canadian History	LECT & TUTR	From the arrival of its first human inhabitants tens of thousands of years ago to its increasingly globalized contemporary population, Canada has undergone numerous transformations. This course will examine the history of Canada from its earliest times to the present focusing of key transformations in the country's environmental, social, political, economic and cultural history. This survey of the nation-state from coast to coast will introduce students to the main themes in Canadian history. It will trace broad changes over time and the consequences of colonization, ecological transformation, the development of an industrial capitalist economy, the emergence of the Canadian state, the role of global imperialism, urbanization, and Canada's changing position in international politics. In a country that is in the midst of tremendous change this course will help students understand the transformations of the past and the roots of our present circumstances.

AP/HIST 2900 6.0	Y	Global Indigenous Histories	ONLINE: LECT & TUTR	This course compares the histories of Indigenous peoples around the world. It explores Indigenous rights, lands and resource conflicts, Indigenous-state relations, language and cultural revitalization, and political activism. Case studies may include Australia, New Zealand, Scandinavia, Africa, the South Pacific, Japan, the Americas, and the Circumpolar North. It also focuses on local Anishinaabe, Wendat, and Haudenosaunee First Nations.
AP/HIST 3125 3.0	F	Sport and Society in Ancient Greece	LECT & TUTR	This course studies the place of athletic competition in ancient Greek society, with a particular focus on the Archaic and Classical periods (eighth - fourth centuries BC) and on the panhellenic games, of which the Olympic Games were the most important.
AP/HIST 3135 3.0	W	Spectacle and Society in Ancient Rome	LECT & TUTR	This course traces the development of gladiatorial presentations, chariot-races and other public spectacles in Rome, Italy and the Roman Empire from 200 BC to 400 AD. It concentrates in particular on their changing nature, scale and socio-cultural function.
AP/HIST 3801 3.0 (2 sections)	F & W	Video Games and History	LECT & TUTR	This course introduces students to the video game industry and the development of video games as a social and technological phenomenon since the 1970s. It analyzes genre, narratives, themes, the use of History, and the depiction of class, gender, and race in video games. It also pays attention to the impact of video games on individuals and society.
AP/HIST 3850 6.0	Y	Murder and Other Crimes: Law and Justice in 19th & 20th Century North America	LECT & TUTR	Examines the Canadian and American criminal justice systems from the mid-19th through late 20th century. The course focuses on important trials - such as Lizzie Borden (1892), the "Scottsboro Boys" (1931), and Steven Truscott (1959) - and how our explanations of these crimes are shaped by factors such as politics and the popular press, racial stereotypes, and contemporary understandings of gender and class. The course also looks at the role of the legal system, particularly the Supreme Court, showing both how the criminal law was applied in murder trials, as well as how these cases often resulted in changing interpretations of the law, and new developments in our understandings of civil rights.

AP/HIST 1095 6.0	Y	Streetlife: The Culture and History of European Cities	LECT & TUTR	<p>This course uses a diverse range of materials and approaches to examine the development of the modern European city in the contemporary world. It uses cultural sources such as film, photography, literature and music to see how the experience of the modern European city has been represented from the nineteenth century to the present day. The course also uses the history of the modern European city to explore historical issues such as the experience of war, poverty and wealth, social reform, and the growth of cosmopolitanism and multiracialism. It explores the material space of urban development by looking at architecture, urban planning and housing. The course reflects upon current social and political issues in the modern European city, such as gentrification, popular protest and globalization.</p>
AP/HIST 1100 6.0	Y	Gladiators, Gods, Gigolos, and Goths: Reading Roman Society, c.200 BCE-c.500 CE	LECT & TUTR	<p>Through a series of case studies concerning the social history of ancient Rome, this course introduces students to the written texts and other media that are used to understand human societies of all periods. Special emphasis will be given to the diverse interpretative approaches that one can bring to such texts and artefacts.</p>
