AP/HIST 1030 6.0	SU	Imperialism and Nationalism in Modern Asia	ONLN	--	--	Through examining the broad contours of historical contact and focusing on a series of case studies concerning European imperialism and modern nationalism in Asia, this course introduces students to the primary, secondary, and tertiary sources that form colonial and postcolonial discourses. It also introduces to students historical debates that ground and shape international relations in and on Asia today.
AP/HIST 2100 6.0	SU	Ancient Greece and Rome	ONLN: LECT & TUTR	--	--	A study of the Greek and Roman world, with particular emphasis on its social, economic and intellectual history, using primary sources archaeological, epigraphic and literary wherever possible.
AP/HIST 3160 6.0	SU	Women and Gender in Ancient Greece and Rome	ONLN: LECT & TUTR	--	--	The course explores the social, economic, political and cultural history of women in ancient Greece and Rome. It examines Greek and Roman concepts of gender and sexuality, and considers the literary and artistic representation of women in these cultures.
AP/HIST 3315 3.0	S1	Modern Ukrainian History	ONLN	--	--	This course focuses on the integration of Ukrainians into the Habsburg and Russian empires, socio-economic change, cultural and ideological development and the emergence of a modern Ukrainian nation. Other topics include the Revolution of 1917-1921, Soviet and Western Ukraine between the wars, the impact of the Second World War and developments in Soviet Ukraine in the post-war period.
AP/HIST 3395 6.0	SU	From the Defeat of Fascism to the Fall of Communism: Europe Since 1945	ONLN: LECT & TUTR	--	--	A survey of significant themes in European history from the end of the Second World War to the present day.
AP/HIST 3670 3.0	S2	US Business History Since 1880: The Origins and Consequences of Managerial Capitalism	ONLN: LECT & TUTR	--	--	This course explores the inception, rise, development, maturing and present state of the US economy and the changing nature of business organization. Connections with political and social change will also be emphasized.
AP/HIST 3691 3.0	S1	America's Cold War	LECT	TR	14:30- 17:30	This course analyzes the Cold War as a clash of ideologies and "empires" and explores its impact on US foreign policy

						and on the political, economic, social, and cultural life of the United States.
AP/HIST 3731 6.0	SU	20th Century Mexico: Sex, Drugs and Revolution	ONLN	--	--	This course considers the 1911 Mexican Revolution and its consequences, especially processes of migration, urbanization and cultural change.
AP/HIST 4420 6.0	SU	Great Britain in the 20th Century	ONLN	TR	11:30-14:30	An examination of selected themes in British history during the 20th century.

AP/HIST 2100 6.0	Y	Ancient Greece and Rome	LECT	MW	10:30-11:30	A study of the Greek and Roman world, with particular emphasis on its social, economic and intellectual history, using primary sources archaeological, epigraphic and literary wherever possible.
AP/HIST 2150 6.0	Y	Classical Greek and Roman Archaeology: An Introduction	LECT	M	11:30-14:30	The course provides an introduction to the history, theory and methodology of Classical Greek and Roman Archaeology. It examines key archaeological excavations in the Graeco-Roman world to explore the history of Greek and Roman archaeology, circa 1700 to the present. Introducing students to the formation processes of the archaeological record, it also examines modern archaeological methodology, theory and recording techniques.

AP/HIST 2500 6.0	Y	Canadian History	LECT & TUTR	R	10:30-12:30	From the arrival of its first human inhabitants tens of thousands of years ago to its increasingly globalized contemporary population, Canada has undergone numerous transformations. This course will examine the history of Canada from its earliest times to the present focusing of key transformations in the country's environmental, social, political, economic and cultural history. This survey of the nation-state from coast to coast to coast will introduce students to the main themes in Canadian history. It will trace broad changes over time and the consequences of colonization, ecological transformation, the development of an industrial capitalist economy, the emergence of the Canadian state, the role of global imperialism, urbanization, and Canada's changing position in international politics. In a country that is in the midst of tremendous change this course will help students understand the transformations of the past and the roots of our present circumstances.
AP/HIST 2501 3.0	W	Canada 101: A History of Canada since 1850	ONLN	--	--	This course examines the evolution of Canada from the perspective of people, places, and social processes, and explores what it has meant to be Canadian across time and space since 1850.
AP/HIST 3315 3.0	W	Modern Ukrainian History	ONLN	--	--	This course focuses on the integration of Ukrainians into the Habsburg and Russian empires, socio-economic change, cultural and ideological development and the emergence of a modern Ukrainian nation. Other topics include the Revolution of 1917-1921, Soviet and Western Ukraine between the wars, the impact of the Second World War and developments in Soviet Ukraine in the post-war period.
AP/HIST 3365 3.0	F	European Fascism: 1890-1945	LECT	T	14:30-17:30	This course examines the varieties of European fascism that emerge after 1890, the intellectual and cultural origins of fascist ideology and the nature of fascist movements and regimes in inter-war Europe.
AP/HIST 3392 3.0	W	The Spanish Civil War	LECT	T	14:30-17:30	While examining the causes and nature of the Spanish Civil War, this course also considers the place of the conflict in European politics and culture.

AP/HIST 3490 6.0	Y	20th-Century Britain in Film and Culture	LECT	W	11:30-14:30	This course examines twentieth century British history largely through the medium of film. The course comprises background lectures on important events and developments in twentieth century Britain, film viewings, and lectures and tutorials analyzing and discussing the films.
AP/HIST 3618 3.0	F	United States Since 1945	LECT	T	11:30-14:30	This course examines the conflicts and contradictions of American politics, culture, and society since the end of World War II. Through popular culture, journalism and political sources, we explore how social movements like civil rights, feminism, and the religious right changed the United States and probe the relationship between America's global military and economic power and ordinary people's lives.
AP/HIST 3670 3.0	W	US Business History Since 1880: The Origins and Consequences of Managerial Capitalism	LECT	T	11:30-14:30	This course explores the inception, rise, development, maturing and present state of the US economy and the changing nature of business organization. Connections with political and social change will also be emphasized.
AP/HIST 3801 3.0	F & W	Video Games and History	LECT & TUTOR	M	14:30-16:30	This course introduces students to the video game industry and the development of video games as a social and technological phenomenon since the 1970s. It analyzes genre, narratives, themes, the use of History, and the depiction of class, gender, and race in video games. It also pays attention to the impact of video games on individuals and society.
