### MPPAL Update



MPPAL student Paula Tablon Modica presented her MRP poster at the [Canadian Health & Wellbeing in Developmental Disabilities Virtual Conference](#) (February 9-10, 2022). At this conference, Paula presented her MRP as a research poster entitled, ***Advisory perspectives of co-creating a Canadian autism mental health literacy resource: A preliminary qualitative analysis***. This work primarily focuses on stakeholder engagement experiences. Specifically, the research is looking at autistic adults' and caregivers' experiences of co-creating national mental health literacy resources and participating in a national mental health promotion project. The CHWDD Conference brought together professionals from different fields (e.g., health care, research, community, administrators, education, policy) working to improve the lives of people with developmental disabilities across the lifespan, related to health, mental health and well-being.

Paula also participated in the Faculty of Graduate Studies Knowledge Now initiative launched in 2021, highlighting the diverse and cutting-edge graduate research from York University's 10 Faculties. This initiative features short interviews with nominated Master and Doctoral-level students to share their research and how their research can impact society. 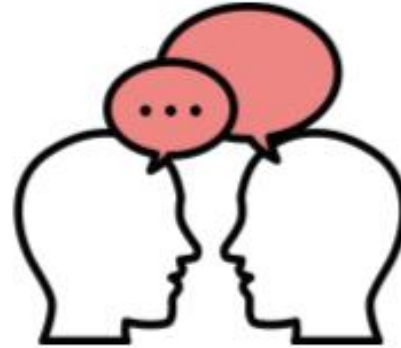
*“In January 2022, I had the privilege of participating in the 2022 Knowledge Now initiative after being nominated by the Masters of Public Policy, Administration and Law's Graduate Program Director, Dr. Naomi Couto. I showcased my interdisciplinary Major Research Paper (Supervisor: Dr. Jonathan Weiss, Faculty of Health - Psychology Department) through a recorded interview exploring stakeholder engagement experiences of autistic adults and caregivers in a national mental health literacy promotion project ([Autism Mental Health Literacy Project](#)). With support from Dr. Couto, I can bridge my autism research work and academic pursuit in MPPAL in ways that I did not know were possible. The opportunity to represent the MPPAL and disseminate the work I've been involved in over the past two years is very humbling. It also encourages me to continue working on projects that promote the well-being of priority populations.” – Paula Tablon Modica*

## MPPAL Update

For the second year in a row, York MPPAL students competed virtually in the CAPP/PA National Public Administration Case competition. Carleton University officially hosted, although the competition took place via Zoom due to COVID-19. Five outstanding students (Gillian Wassmansdorf, Lauren Dranitsaris, Gurkamal Dhahan, Arman Hamidan and Maggie de Barra) proudly represented York, finishing tied-fourth among 14 others from across Canada. Professor Zac Spicer coached the team for the first time this year.



The case this year focused on rough sleeping and homeless encampments. York's team was praised for their forward thinking approach to the policy problem and the way in which they humanized the complex challenges that encampment residents confront on a daily basis. The judges were particularly struck by the team's focus on data collection, stabilizing the health, safety and sanitary conditions of encampments and building supportive pathways for encampment residents to move to permanent housing.

## York University Security Services Review

Recently the Vice President, Finance and Administration (VPFA) shared that York University is undertaking a review of its security services to develop an alternative delivery model to create a safe community for all. This is a forward-looking, community driven review which will utilize consultations with the York community to develop concrete actions for change. We have been appointed by the VPFA to help lead this process. Our team is made up of York students, faculty and staff who have diverse expertise and lived experiences to bring to this review. In addition, an external consultant, Dr. Shaheen Azmi, has been hired to support this review. The VPFA's announcement, which includes a full description of our team, can be found [here](#).

We are writing to invite you to participate and to help us in advancing this critical work.

This review will take an anti-racist, justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion lens. The Security Services Review is a commitment within the University's [Action Plan on Black Inclusion](#) and reflects similar work across the country, as described in the [Scarborough Charter on Anti-Black Racism and Black Inclusion in Canadian Higher Education](#).

To enable engagement and participation from the York community, a multi-faceted engagement and consultation process will take place over winter-spring 2022. The process will include written submissions, focus groups, town halls and small group meetings. You can learn more about the security services review by visiting our [website](#).

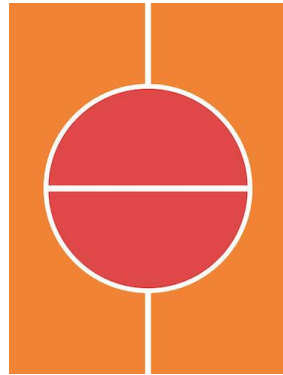

### Pandemic Policy-Making: Incomplete Science and Political Decision-Making?

In responding to the current pandemic, Canadian politicians have been regularly counselled to ‘follow the science’, even when being asked to make numerous policy decisions based on incomplete or ever-changing information. This advice serves two different masters: the best possible public health outcomes as well as political cover for incumbent governments. But the changing course in mid-stream often undermines public trust, undercuts public willingness to follow rules, and may actually serve to harm desired health outcomes. This lecture will explore how the current pandemic has highlighted the challenges for political policymakers and discuss how their unique leadership role requires a delicate balance of expectations between science and politics.



Herschell Ezrin, OOnt is Senior Fellow of Advocacy, Public Affairs and Strategic Communications at Global Public Affairs. He is a former senior public servant in Ottawa, Canadian diplomat and senior political adviser for three levels of government. He is a former CEO of two multinational companies. Hershell is also a former corporate director in the energy, financial services and service sectors and a leader in health, arts and community affairs. He currently lectures in two post-graduate programs, is a Distinguished Fellow, Strategy at Ryerson's Ted Rogers School of Management; Senior Fellow, Ted Rogers Leadership Centre; Professor, Government Relations at Seneca@York and is an honorary lifetime governor of the Canadian Journalism Foundation. He was named to the Order of Ontario in 2021

## Consultation: Ontario's anti-racism strategic plan review

Submit your feedback to help eliminate systemic racism and ensure racism and hate never limit social and economic opportunities for people in Ontario.

The Government of Ontario has launched a review of [A Better Way Forward: Ontario's Anti-Racism Strategic Plan](#), that was released on March 7, 2017.

A fundamental part of this review will be consulting with the public on the progress of the strategy (please see annual [progress report](#) for details) and on policy priorities impacting Indigenous, Black, Jewish, Muslim and other racialized communities, including **inclusive economic empowerment, addressing racially motivated hate and supporting children & youth.**

Public input and feedback from community leaders and organizations will inform Ontario's future anti-racism initiatives and advance racial equity.

The Anti-Racism Directorate (ARD) will be working in partnership with community organizations and leaders to ensure that the review is inclusive and that populations most adversely impacted are meaningfully engaged. This is a critical time for the anti-racism community in Ontario and much work remains to be done. The review will ensure that the province continues to uphold its commitment to address the impacts of systemic racism, and that all children, youth and families in Ontario are able to achieve their aspirations.
