DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Dear friends,

I would like to start by expressing my upmost gratitude to Dr. McGregor for her work and tireless dedication to CIKL since its inception. The Centre would not have progressed as quickly if not for her leadership and vision. While I know that we are all saddened that she will not be returning as Director, I am excited for her continued community focused research and collaborations with us.

What a year it has been! Our second year has built on the momentum of our inaugural year. We have increased our membership to over 50 active members. We have a newly designed wordmark, created by an Indigenous YorkU design student that launched over Congress 2023! One of our most significant achievements this year was leading parts of the successful Connected Minds grant submitted by York University. This cumulative project totals more than \$318 million over the next 7 years and was closely supported by Drs. Green and Chacaby.

We ran 32 events this year and brought in our first Visiting Scholar, Dr. Ted Jojola, in January 2023 (co-sponsored by EUC). We also hosted a weekly Coffee Social in conjunction with the Harriet Tubman Institute. Brock Pitawanakwat (Associate Director) and Nathalie LaCoste Ling (Coordinator) organized a Professional Development Workshop series that focused on research and writing skills for students and faculty. The CIKL Research seminar series featured five Early Career Researchers, each of whom presented their current work. We also hired 11 student trainees to assist with research, communications, event planning, and outreach initiatives.

In the coming year we will be establishing our Executive Committee. We will also provide further opportunities for our members to develop research skills and support in advancing their careers. For our trainees, we are creating a Research Lab that will bring trainees together and offer a unique learning experiences. Finally, we will continue making our space more inviting by adding artwork in our office as part of our collaboration with the AGYU.

I can't thank enough those who work behind the scenes to make CIKL and our events happen! A special thanks to Brock Pitawanakwat our Associate Director and Nathalie LaCoste Ling our Center Coordinator for their work and commitment. Looking forward to another exciting year!













Design: The centrepiece of our wordmark is the turtle, it represents Turtle Island. The turtle symbolizes identity, culture, and a connection to the earth.

Font: Both the turtle and the font of "CIKL" beneath the turtle celebrate the many communities who presently use or formerly used syllabics.

Colour: The beautiful purple colour in our wordmark is inspired by the Haudenosaunee flag.

NEW LANGUAGE RESOURCES

A successful new initiative that we launched in year two is a collection of Indigenous language resources, which focus on 38 languages currently spoken by First Nations, Inuit and Metis peoples.

THE INDIGENOUS CLIMATE LEADERSHIP AND SELF-DETERMINED FUTURES CIRC GRANT

This Indigenous-led research project, spanning over three years, is supported by York University's Catalyzing Interdisciplinary Research Cluster and administered through CIKL. It primarily explores living in harmony with the earth and understanding its impact on well-being.

This project is lead by Angele Alook (co-PI) & Deborah McGregor (co-PI) and also on the grant are Alan Corbiere, Sean Hillier, Lisa Myers, Carolyn Podruchny, Brock Pitawanakwat & Martha Stiegman



The goals of the project are to:

- (1) advance understanding and support of Indigenous climate leadership and governance through a decolonial and gendered lens
- (2) strengthen and revitalize Indigenous languages and ways of knowing by using land-based knowledge and language activities to enhance Indigenous leadership and action
- (3) develop a distinct Indigenous understanding and practice of the One Health approach, supporting the concept of Indigenous capacity to live well.



"LONGHOUSE" BY DR. KENZIE ALLEN

In September 2022, Dr. Kenzie Allen, Assistant Professor of English at York University, shared her "Longhouse" poem in our first CIKL Research Seminar. In June 2023, she was invited to install it on campus for Congress. Read her explanation of the significance behind the poem below and be sure to check it out in the CIBC Lobby of Accolade East (YorkU, Keele Campus).







The poem is a type of concrete poem or calligram, wherein the shape of the poem speaks somewhat to the subject matter, in this case, that of a Haudenosaunee longhouse. The idea with this series is that the single continuous line of the poem actively constructs the living space as the words twist and turn across the page, just as the text reads anaphorically, "We build it, we build the longhouse, we build the longhouse as our ancestors have done..." The poem comes from my manuscript-in-progress, Wampum, and another piece in the series (https://poets.org/poem/109-bermuda) and was published in the Academy of American Poets' Poem-a-Day feature last year.





The "Longhouse" poem fit well with the Congress theme of Reckonings & Reimaginings. The vinyl form and size was recommended by Ruth Green, and Liz McMahan helped arrange its installation.


