MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Dear GLRC Community,

It was a busy month at the GLRC. More than 50 participants attended the Global Labour Research Centre's (GLRC) 9th Annual Graduate Student Symposium, *Critical Conversations in Work & Labour*. Spread across <u>13 panels</u>, conversations interrogated the role of artificial intelligence, care work and reproductive labour, migration, climate action, higher education, social and political struggles, and more. The conference also featured a keynote address by Arun Khundnani titled, *What is Anti-Racism? And Why It Means Anti-Capitalism*, which is now available for <u>viewing online</u>.

This could not have happened without the tireless efforts of the organizing committee: Alaa Abdelhamid, Nicole Jokinen-Hurl, Tinu Koithara Mathew, Carmen Ponce and Julie Wilson. A special thanks are also due to conference panels chairs, as well as Abigail Bakan (OISE, University of Toronto), Anne Thomson-Eleen, Paul Bocking (United Steelworkers Humanity Fund), Duygu Gulseren (Human Resource Management, York University), and Kaitlin Peters (College of Early Childhood Educators) for their thoughtful comments and participation.

Switching gears, the GLRC has decided it will cease participation on "X" (formerly known as Twitter) as a result of extensive misinformation, amplification of hate speech, unreliability and anti-worker practices, particularly from its owner, Elon Musk, which do not align with the values of the Centre. We are currently exploring alternatives and will be sure to keep the GLRC community informed of what comes next.
