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Global Research Excellence (GRE) Seed Fund

Below are guidelines and the application forms for the Global Research Excellence (GRE) Seed Funding program's inaugural call for proposals. There are two funding Streams-A and B, and published online.

During the consultations for the Global Engagement Strategy (GES), we heard from faculty about the importance of a seed fund to support international research collaborations- something many of our peers have offered for many years. Consequently, this was one of the commitments made in York's first Global Engagement Strategy launched in 2023. Subsequently, we consulted with internal and external constituents from diverse disciplines, Faculties, career stages, geographic foci, types of collaborations and organizations to develop a versatile seed funding program to support investigator-led global research. The GRE design was further significantly shaped by the extensive input we received from ADRs and their teams.

Stream A (Strategic Partnerships Exploration & Development): 5,000-30,000 CAD. 5,000 CAD awards do not require matching. Anything above that will require 50% matching for eligible expenses. An international collaborator is required. For Stream A, we will also accept applications requesting conditional matching upon success in external grant competitions.

Stream B (Towards 2030: Advancing Multilateralism): 5,000-15,000 CAD. 25% matching for eligible expenses is required. This is primarily for knowledge mobilization collaborations with multilateral organizations/platforms to advance grand global challenges like SDGs.

We will accept applications from May, 2024-April, 2025. Application deadline is rolling to empower our faculty to respond to external funding & other opportunities.

GRE will be one of the key strategies we will employ to be competitive in emerging opportunities like Horizon Europe, and the growing interest among our faculty to collaborate with the global south and various Unites Nations bodies.

GRE will be coordinated by the Global Strategic Initiatives team which reports to the AVP Global Engagement and is a cross portfolio unit that connects YI with VPRI to advance the GES pillars for research and reputation.

Please share this opportunity within your respective Faculties. We look forward to working with you to continue improving GRE and strengthening research internationalization efforts.

In particular, the course will identify risks that arise when ignoring or downplaying the racial hierarchies that constitute ontological divisions between humans, not-quite-humans, and nonhumans. Our ultimate objective is to develop self-reflexive and analytical skills that work to expose the seemingly innocuous yet nefarious ways racial thinking informs contemporary hierarchies of being and worth.

IDRC: Call for letters of interest: Addressing neglected areas of sexual and reproductive health and rights in sub-Saharan Africa (ANSRHRA)

Canada's International Development Research Centre (IDRC) has announced a <u>Call for Letters of Interest</u>: Addressing neglected areas of sexual and reproductive health and rights in sub-Saharan Africa (ANSRHRA). IDRC and other funding partners are investing up to CAD\$19.1 million to fund up to 16 implementation research teams (IRTs) to support gender-transformative implementation research in sub-Saharan Africa. Up to eight IRTs will be funded in this first cohort of projects. A second call is anticipated for up to eight additional IRTs to be funded as a second cohort in the fall of 2026.

Focused on investments to transform service design and delivery and to strengthen the development and implementation of equitable and sustainable movements, the ANSRHRA Initiative will contribute to improved sexual and reproductive health and realization of rights while also building systems and structures that enable and support underserved populations, including women and girls, to demand and benefit from the full spectrum of sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR).

Amount:

up to \$50,000 for proposal-development for a duration of 3 months; and up to \$1.2M for the project, including 13% indirect costs.

Duration:

Up to 3 years

Eligibility:

At the LOI stage, IRTs must consist of:

- 1. A principal applicant who is a sub-Saharan Africa-based researcher (citizen or permanent resident of an African country) with a position in an institution based in an eligible country.
- 2. A co-principal applicant who is a senior member of a civil society organization led by and/or prioritizing underserved populations, including women and girls, who has been active in supporting priority areas of SRHR based in the same country as the principal applicant's institution.
- 3. A co-principal applicant who is an <u>independent researcher</u> based at a Canadian institution.
- 4. A co-applicant who is a relevant local-, district- or national-level decision-maker, based in the same country as the principal applicant's institution.

Focus areas:

Proposed implementation-research projects must address at least one of the priority areas of SRHR, address all of the Initiative's objectives (see Annex 1) and integrate the core design elements throughout the project's design. Teams may also include other areas of SRHR provided they justify why this area should be prioritized for gender-transformative implementation research with their focus population(s). The five priority areas for the ANSRHRA Initiative are:

Improving access to family planning and contraceptive services for those who want to delay or prevent pregnancy, which could prevent 67 million unintended pregnancies and avoid 35 million induced abortions across the globe.

Expanding access to safe abortion care where legally permitted and post-abortion care (APAC), which is an essential component of SRH services. Upholding SRHR rights and ensuring access to services for adolescents, which is critical to meeting global health, economic and sustainability goals.

Preventing sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) and improving services for people experiencing SGBV, which is critical to empowering underserved populations, and particularly women and girls, to exercise their self-determination and autonomy related to their SRHR and all aspects of their lives. Strengthening advocacy for SRHR, which requires comprehensive approaches that cross public, political, health, economic and legislative spheres. This Initiative has a dual focus on advocacy as a priority area for implementation research as well as an expected outcome across all areas of SRHR. Implementation-research projects implementing, evaluating, adapting and scaling evidence-based, community-informed SRHR advocacy initiatives would therefore be eligible for funding. This is intended to generate and translate evidence on gender-transformative advocacy interventions as well as address the lack of evidence on how to effectively link and translate advocacy initiatives to build system sustainability and accountability across all areas of SRHR.

Application procedures:

Applicants are invited to submit a letter of interest (LOI) to IDRC. This stage requires applicants to complete an eligibility checklist and upload supporting documents. Only applicants who are successful at the LOI stage will be invited to submit a full technical proposal.

The Black/ African Feminisms Conference on the 19th (virtual) and 20th (in-person) of April 2024, is an invitation to interact with a community of presenters, panelists and conference attendees to explore the multitude of perspectives on the topic. Blackness is not a monolith. Within the Canadian context, Black Canadians represent a range of people of African descent from the continent and the diaspora. The goal of the conference is to create space to share and discuss these complexities and commonalities. It is the brainchild of Dr. Njoki Wane, a celebrated and renowned scholar, whose work focuses on gender, colonialism, anti-colonialism, Black Feminisms, Indigenous knowledge practices, spirituality, African immigrant women in Canada and anti-racism education. As the chair of the Department of Social Justice Education at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE), University of Toronto, Dr. Wane's contributions to the field offer opportunities for dialogue and inquiry into Black identity.

The overarching theme of the conference is "Black/African Health and Well-Being." Other themes that will be explored include, but not limited to, conceptualizing Black/African health, healing spaces, spirituality, empowerment, self-care, peacebuilding, reconciliation, intergenerational health and wisdom, and emotional well-being. According to Wane (2014), it is evident that there is no universal Black experience; however, there is a call for concerted efforts to forge intellectual and cultural linkages rooted in our common origins.

Black Feminisms are therefore the convergence point where our past, present and future voices, our struggles and triumphs and holistic stories can be told, celebrated and handed over to future generations (Wane, 2014). This is a clarion call for all of us Black Feminists scattered across the globe to come together and

form a powerful circle that will "collapse all screens that threaten to obscure our eyes from the beauties of the world" (Ogundipe-Leslie & Ourselves, 1994; Wane, 2014).

2024 SFARI Pilot – Request for Applications

The Simons Foundation Autism Research Initiative (SFARI) recently announced a Request for Applications (RFA) for its 2024 Pilot Award program. These grants are intended to provide early support for exploratory ideas. A summary is provided below.

To provide early support for exploratory ideas, particularly those with novel hypotheses. Appropriate projects for this mechanism include those considered higher risk but with the potential for transformative results, including work in human subjects.

Applications that propose research to link genetic or other ASD risk factors to molecular, cellular, circuit or behavioral mechanisms and set the stage for development of novel interventions are encouraged.

Note: Projects that represent continuations of ongoing work (whether funded by SFARI or other funders) are not appropriate for this mechanism.
