

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are 17 ambitious objectives for a greener, healthier, more peaceful, and equal planet. On 25 September 2015, after three years of discussion and consultation, all 193 UN Member States finally agreed and signed the SDGs, committing to achieve them by 2030. WHAT IS THE SDG STUDENTS PROGRAM CERTIFICATE?



Developed in partnership with the Ban Ki-moon Centre for Global Citizens and the SDG Academy, the SDG Students Program Certificate is a non-credit certificate to encourage SDG Hub Members to learn about, engage with, and taken action on the SDGs. Certificate are signed by Ban Ki-moon (Co-Chair, Ban Ki-moon Centre for Global Citizens), Chandrika Bahadur (President, SDSN Association) and Siamak Loni (Global Coordinator, SDSN Youth).

WHO CAN EARN A CERTIFICATE?

Any SDG Hub Member or SDG Coordinator who is registered with the SDG Students Program.

THE CERTIFICATE CRITERION

To be attain an SDG Students Program Certificate, you must fulfil the following criterion:

Complete <u>Sustainable</u> <u>Development in the 21st</u> <u>Century with Ban Ki-moon</u>	Write an Op-Ed on an SDG- related topic in relation to your local community for the SDSN Youth blog	Volunteer 17 hours with an NGO/ community organisation working on the SDGs
Complete ANY additional SDG Academy course	Attend 2 Education Activities of the SDG Student Hub	Attend a Solutions/ Action Activity of the SDG Student Hub
Complete UN CC: e-Learn's Introductory e-Course on Climate Change	Attend an SDSN Youth Workplace Live

LEARN ABOUT -SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT IN THE 21ST CENTURY WITH BAN KI-MOON

Enrol in and complete the course "<u>Sustainable Development in the 21st Century with Ban Kimoon</u>", co-developed by the Ban Kimoon Centre for Global Citizens and Yonsei University's Institute for Global Engagement and Empowerment. Completing this criterion is expected to give you a foundational understanding of sustainable development and the SDGs.

Proof of Completion: As Coursera charges a fee for certificates, but does not charge for enrolment, we do not require you to pay for a certificate (though it is encouraged). You may submit either a PDF of the course certificate, or a screenshot of completion of the course progress bar if you do not pay for the certificate.

LEARN ABOUT ANY ADDITIONAL COURSE FROM THE SDG ACADEMY

Enrol in and complete any course run by the <u>SDG Academy</u> based on the topics and SDGs you are most interested in learning more about. Completing this criterion is expected to give you additional understanding of a specific topic within sustainable development that you are curious about.

Proof of Completion: As EdX charges a fee for certificates, but does not charge for enrolment, we do not require you to pay for a certificate (though it is encouraged). You may submit either a PDF of the course certificate, or a screenshot of completion of the course progress bar if you do not pay for the certificate.



DETAILED CRITERION

LEARN ABOUT INTRODUCTORY E-COURSE ON CLIMATE CHANGE

Enrol in and complete the course "Introductory e-Course on Climate Change", developed by UN CC: e-Learn, an initiative of a consortium of UN agencies including the UNFCCC and UNITAR. Completing this criterion is expected to give you foundational understanding of climate changes and its impacts.

Proof of Completion: As UN CC: e-Learn does not charge fees for its courses, you must submit a PDF of the course certificate.

ENGAGE WITH OP-ED ON AN SDG-RELATED TOPIC IN RELATION TO YOUR COMMUNITY

Submit and have approved an op-ed for the SDG Students Program blog. You may refer to the <u>SDSN Youth Blog Guide</u> for more information on how to prepare your blog post draft. Completing this criterion is meant to give you the experience and confidence to advocate for the SDGs in professional, online settings. Blog post drafts can be submitted <u>here</u>, and decisions on whether to approve a draft rest solely with the SDSN Youth Communications Team.

Proof of Completion: Submit a link to the published blog post.

ENGAGE WITH - ATTEND 2 EDUCATION ACTIVITIES

Attend 2 Education Activities of your SDG Student Hub, and write a 500-word reflection for each activity that touches on the key lessons and takeaways you had from the activities, as well as some initial thoughts on how you can apply what you've learnt. Completing this criterion is intended to encourage you to actively participate with your SDG Student Hub and expand your understanding of sustainable development.

Proof of Completion: Submit your reflections directly through the online Podio form.



DETAILED CRITERION



ENGAGE WITH ATTEND AN SDSN YOUTH WORKPLACE LIVE

Attend a monthly Workplace Live hosted on SDSN Youth's Workplace, and write a 300-word reflection that touches on the key lessons and takeaways you had from the webinar, as well as some initial thoughts on how you can apply what you've learnt. Completing this criterion is intended to encourage you to actively participate with SDSN Youth's global community and give you access to some of the world's leading experts on the SDGs.

Proof of Completion: Submit your reflections directly through the online Podio form.

TAKE ACTION -VOLUNTEER 17 HOURS WITH AN NGO/ COMMUNITY ORGANISATION

Volunteer with an NGO or a community organisation working on the SDGs for at least 17 hours (though we encourage you to give more time if you can!). This should be a formally-registered organisation in your country or community, and should not be a student society or an unregistered organisation. Not sure where to start in your hometown? You can also check out <u>UN Volunteers</u> for ways to contribute online. Completing this criterion is meant to give you a greater understanding of how the SDGs are advanced on the ground.

Proof of Completion: Please request for a letter from the organisation you've volunteered with, signed by a staff member who has supervised you. The letter should certify the number of hours you've given and the type of contributions you've made. We require you to submit a soft copy of this letter.

TAKE ACTION ATTEND A SOLUTIONS/ ACTION ACTIVITY

Attend a Solutions/ Action Activity of your SDG Student Hub, and write a 500-word reflection for each activity that touches on the key lessons and takeaways you had from the activities, as well as some initial thoughts on how you can apply what you've learnt. Completing this criterion is intended to give you the basic skills you need to take action on the SDGs in your local community.

Proof of Completion: Submit your reflections directly through the online Podio form.





FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1) DOES MY CERTIFICATE EXPIRE?

No. Your SDG Students Program Certificate does not have an expiry date, but we encourage you to continue to do more to advance the SDGs even after you attain a certificate.

2) WHAT IF MY CERTIFICATE APPLICATION WAS NOT APPROVED?

Our Project Officers will let you know which criterion(s) did not pass our assessment - you're welcome to redo those segments that have been identified and apply again.

3) CAN THE CERTIFICATE COUNT FOR COURSE CREDITS?

No. The SDG Students Program Certificate is a non-credit course that is not eligible for you to claim course credits from your university.

4) WHAT IF MY UNIVERSITY IS NOT PART OF THE PROGRAM?

Sorry, but this means that we aren't able to issue you an SDG Students Program Certificate. A full map of our existing SDG Student Hubs around the world can be found at this <u>link</u>.
