Teaching Commons H5P Workshop Series



Did you know that in eClass, you can use H5P (HTML 5 Package) to create rich interactive content for your students and add them to your course? Currently, we have 40 plus H5P interactive content components available via the eClass content bank. Starting from Winter 2022, Teaching Commons is rolling out a series of hands-on workshops aimed at introducing colleagues to the 10 most requested H5P content types.

Workshop I: Interactive Videos

In this hands-on workshop, we will introduce and walk you through the practice of using H5P to add interactions to instructional videos such as multiple-choice questions, pop-up texts, and other types of dynamic activities.

Teaching in Focus (TiF) Conference 2022 – Save the Date!



TiF 2022 is taking place on **May 11 and 12** with a theme of, **Rest, Renew, Revitalize**, to encourage us as a collective, to pause and reflect on our personal needs before we attend to the pieces of our practice that need or deserve attention. In order to build professional AND personal capacity, we need to first build a positive and respectful community where all are welcome to exchange ideas, provide support, and lift each other up.



Creative Course Content: Instructional Strategies for Online Learning (March 28-April 29, 2022)

This course can count toward the [Certificate of Proficiency in Teaching for eLearning](#).

Communicating course content to students is one of the biggest differences between teaching online and in a face-to-face classroom. While the lecture is a mainstay of the traditional classroom, the online environment presents several challenges to this approach, ranging from the technical (inconsistent internet access for students) to the cognitive (student attention dropping during a standard lecture). In this fully online course, participants will learn by doing through ongoing participation in weekly learning activities. Together we will model alternatives to the “standard” lecture, practice creative and efficient ways to convey content to students, apply best practices for designing online instruction of all types, and troubleshoot common challenges.

New course!! SEEDS: Supporting Experiential Education for Diverse Students (Apr. 25-May 27, 2022)

Navigating the complex landscape of accessibility in higher education and in the workplace can be challenging for both students with disabilities and for instructors seeking to support them. These challenges can be amplified in the context of experiential education, as community partners, placement supervisors, and outside experts join the learning environment. In this fully online course, participants will learn in collaboration with their peers and course instructors through ongoing participation in weekly learning activities. Together we will explore key principles and policies, grapple with the complex factors that shape decision making when it comes to accommodation needs, and apply course learning in the creation of concrete, practical resources to use in your own experiential education contexts.
