Reflecting on a Semester of Teaching (Online) (Jan. 13, 2023)

As this semester begins, and the remaining tasks of the last semester are completed, members of the Teaching Commons want to set aside some time with you to support your reflective practice. This active learning session will provide opportunities for you to share with others, in small groups, what went well for you last semester, to discuss pedagogical changes that you may or may not have made, and to reflect on how that went. Also, you might be planning changes for this semester and wish to discuss these with others, or you might be looking forward to seeing how past pedagogical changes manifest on the third or fourth iteration. We will make time for you to reflect individually if that is your present

need. Please come join to talk about reflective practice and how that informs engaged teaching.

The Art of Online Conversation: Designing, Facilitating, and Teaching with Online Discussion Forums (Online) (Jan. 16-Feb 17, 2023)

This course can count toward the [Certificate of Proficiency in Teaching for eLearning](#).

Whether we teach in a traditional face-to-face classroom, a blended environment, or a fully online course, many of us make use of online forums to enhance student learning. Achieving an engaging online discussion, however, is easier said than done! In this fully online course, participants will learn by doing through ongoing participation in weekly discussion forums. We will explore strategies for creating effective prompts, apply best practices for facilitating vibrant and enriching online conversations of all types, and troubleshoot common challenges. We will explore how one's approach to online discussion changes over the span of a semester- or year-long course, and integrate scholarship on eLearning into our understanding of effective online conversations.

Fictional Classrooms: Talking About Teaching Through Narrative (Online) (Jan. 18 – May 31, 2023)

Supporting Linguistic and Cultural Diversity Workshop Series (December 15, 2022 – March 16, 2023)

York University has a linguistically and culturally diverse student community. A substantial number of our students are multilingual English speakers, many of whom came to Canada from abroad. These students bring a wealth of knowledge and experiences to our classrooms. Navigating this diversity of perspectives and meeting everyone's access needs while teaching subject content underscores varying pedagogical needs for instructors and teaching assistants. This 4-part workshop series will introduce participants to practical strategies for supporting multilingual and multicultural students through linguistically responsive, culturally sustaining, and anti-oppressive practices that foster belonging, contribute to academic success, and enhance diverse student voices in the classroom. Through participation in active learning activities, reflective discussions, and collaborative conversations grounded in student-centered pedagogical frameworks, participants will explore how to apply these strategies in their own teaching contexts.

Instructors at York have several platforms for peer-review available to choose from, including eClass Workshop, PeerScholar, Turnitin PeerMark, and a new pilot offering, Kritik. Whether you are exploring peer-review, -feedback, and -grading for the first time, or you are refining your existing approach, we invite you to join us for an immersive experience as we engage with the pedagogy and practice of peer-based learning. Participants can expect to spend approximately two hours asynchronously engaging in peer-review activities in two online platforms of their choosing, followed by one hour of synchronous online discussion about implications and inspirations for their own teaching contexts.

Critical Reflection as a Learned/Learning Activity (February 1 & February 8, 2023)

Students engaged in experiential education activities often benefit from opportunities for critical reflection. These reflection activities can encourage students to make meaningful connections between experiences and course material, while also developing skills in critical thinking, communicating new insights, and using new ideas to inform future actions.

In this workshop, we will engage in discussions and hands-on activities designed to explore frameworks for critical reflection that can be used to help students develop important skills to support their own reflective practice. Activities for encouraging critical reflection will also be explored as strategies to encourage meaningful learning in the classroom.



The Teaching Commons is offering colleagues who teach at York (Course Directors) the opportunity to participate in a formative teaching observation. This process is not a formal evaluation or assessment, but rather a voluntary and collaborative activity designed to inspire a reflective dialogue on classroom teaching. Observations can be done in an in person (face to face) class or a synchronous (live) online class. You may also wish to add your liaison Educational Developer to your eClass site as an auditor to review the overall organization of your site or a particular eClass activity, or to have the Educational Developer observe any combination of synchronous and asynchronous remote and/or in person engagement.
