Instructional Skills for Remote Delivery (ISRD) (ONLINE) June 26-July 7, 2023

This course is designated for those who anticipate that they will be teaching primarily online courses in the 2023-2024 academic year, or for those who for accessibility reasons are unable to attend an <u>in-person Instructional</u> <u>Skills Workshop</u>. During this 2-week online course (approximately 15 hours), participants will work collaboratively in a small group setting (e.g. 1 Facilitator: 6 Participants) to further develop their teaching effectiveness in remote/online learning environments, as well as receiving feedback on teaching strategies and techniques.

Online Assignments: Deep Learning through Engaging Assignments (ONLINE) July 4 – August 4, 2023

This course can count toward the <u>Certificate of Proficiency in Teaching for</u> <u>eLearning</u>.

While some assignments adapt relatively easily to the online environment, others present more challenges, ranging from the technical (managing group presentations online) to the pedagogical (ensuring students get timely and effective support). Rethinking assignments for online learning is a great opportunity to experiment with new approaches, streamline and polish assignment design, and consider how to use assignments to nudge student learning to the next level. In this fully online course, participants will learn by doing through ongoing participation in weekly mini-assignment. Together we will practice creative and efficient approaches to assignment design, apply best practices and pedagogical theory, and troubleshoot common challenges.

Course Design Intensive Summer 2023

This is a one-week intensive and interactive online workshop to get you started designing or updating your course. The workshop is for course directors who would like to enhance an existing course or create a new course design. Packed with creative and practical advice for developing your course, we will cover principles of inclusive course design, assessment and feedback, active learning and engagement strategies, and provide you with the support and resources you need. Please note this is not about remote design and delivery per se, but is about the basis for all instruction.

There are two synchronous meetings during the workshop. Please note attendance at both synchronous sessions is mandatory, and there are asynchronous activities that you will be expected to complete during that week.
