## Creative Course Content: Instructional Strategies for Online Learning (March 31-May 2, 2025)

This course can count toward the <u>Certificate of Proficiency in</u> <u>Teaching for eLearning</u>.

The online environment presents several challenges to delivering course content, ranging from the technical (inconsistent internet access for students) to the cognitive (student attention dropping during a standard lecture). In this fully online course, participants will learn by doing through ongoing participation in weekly learning activities. Together we will model alternatives to the "standard" lecture, practice creative and efficient ways to convey content to students, apply best practices for designing online instruction of all types, and troubleshoot common challenges.
