Canada Research Chair (Tier 2) in Migration and Mobility in the Digital Age – Extended Search

The School of Social Work invites applications for a Tier 2 CRC in Migration and Mobility in the Digital Age at the Assistant Professor or Associate Professor rank. The successful candidate will be appointed to a tenure stream position in the School of Social Work. We seek applicants who demonstrate the potential for major and transformative scholarship on the relationship of digital technologies to global migration and mobility. Following from York's strategic research priorities of Public Engagement for a Just and Sustainable World, and Digital Cultures, and from the School's priority research areas of critical social work, social policy, and global social justice, we are interested in scholars whose work will add significant strength to our established research capacity in the study of migration, resettlement, and precarious status, while at the same time intensifying our research capacity in affiliation with York's Organized Research Units such as the Centre for Refugee Studies, Centre for Research on Latin America and the Caribbean, York Centre for Asian Research, Centre for Feminist Research, and the Institute for Science and Technology Studies. The use of information and communication technologies (ICT) in the national and transnational context is a vital and growing area of research expertise as ICTs are increasingly implicated in the movement and (in)security of people today. This CRC may, for example, engage the digitization of everyday life in relation to questions of identity, inclusion, and/or exclusion, studying the use of biometrics and/or digital technologies in social services, institutional practices and government policies that produce new forms of surveillance and knowledge within and across borders, and, in particular, in the forced migration of people.

The successful candidate will have a PhD in Social Work or a related field, and a BSW or MSW (or the international equivalent of a Social Work degree) with demonstrated excellence or promise of excellence in teaching and scholarly research. This candidate will have in place the active, ongoing, and substantial research portfolio of an emerging world-class researcher with a demonstrated capacity for leadership and the potential to achieve international recognition in the field, and will have demonstrated the potential for excellence in the areas of Migration and Mobility in the Digital Age. Candidates for this position will be committed to progressive social work education which develops theory and practice in relation to human rights and social justice, and thus affirms that personal experiences are embedded in social structures. Such an orientation will be the basis for teaching one of Canada's most diverse student bodies who expect, but are not limited, to practice in the rich diversity of urban Toronto. The successful candidate will be committed to conceptualizing social work as an expression of social justice. Preference will be given to those with experience supervising graduate students and/or the potential to attract, develop, and retain excellent students and future researchers. It is expected that the successful applicant will direct courses related to Migration and Mobility in the Digital Age at all levels, contribute to curricular development in her/his area of specialization, and participate actively in the graduate program. The successful applicant shall be eligible for prompt appointment to the Faculty of Graduate Studies.

The School of Social Work at York University is recognized worldwide as a leader in critical social work. Of special interest for this CRC is our critical perspective on Canadian social policy as it affects migrant communities and racialized communities. Home to the *Canadian Review of Social Policy*, the School includes, among our diverse faculty members, a large number of prolific and well known researchers and writers. The School's diverse student body offers a rich resource for teaching and research with respect to migration, settlement, identity and difference. Our graduate students conduct crucial research in the area of nation building, the Canadian state and social justice. York University is located in Toronto, Ontario, a centre of creativity and commerce with an exceptionally diverse population.

Established by the Government of Canada, the Canada Research Chairs (CRC) program seeks to attract outstanding researchers to Canadian universities. The Tier 2 CRC is for candidates who are within 10 years of having completed their PhD, emerging world-class researchers, acknowledged by their peers as having the potential to lead in their field, and having demonstrated the potential to achieve international recognition and attract students and trainees. Appointments to these Canada Research Chair positions are contingent on a positive internal review by the York University CRC Selection Committee.
